
This Month's Program:

The Korean War, Phase I – Pusan Perimeter

Colonel JP Hogan, USA (Ret), was commissioned as a 2LT

of Armor from Eastern Michigan University. During 29 years of active duty service, he led cavalry and armor units from Platoon to Brigade level.

He earned a graduate degree in Strategic Studies from the US Army War College and has studied and travelled abroad extensively, throughout Europe, Asia, Africa, the Pacific, Central



and South America, and the Middle East.

We are honored to have this distinguished military historian, share his insights on the **Battle of the Pusan Perimeter**, one of the first major engagements of the Korean War, during which an allied army of 140,000 UN troops, having been pushed to the brink of defeat, rallied to make a desperate stand against the invading People's Army of North Korea.

Col. Hogan is co-founder of a leadership development program serving ROTC Programs at the University of North Texas, Texas Christian University, and Baylor University, as well as several mid-size companies. Additionally, he serves as Texas Region Director of the Employer Support to Guard and Reserve Program.

KNOW YOUR PAST COMMANDERS-IN-CHIEF

Captain Rollie Stevens, US Navy

Captain Rollie Stevens graduated from the University of



Iowa, in 1957, with a bachelor's degree. He received his Commission in the US Naval Reserve from Officer Candidate School, Newport, RI, in 1957.

Rollie served on active duty from 1957 to 1962, then continued to serve in the Naval Reserve, rising to the rank of Captain (O-6), having held four commands, the final as

Commanding Officer Military Sealift Command, Pusan, Korea (1983-1985).

Following release from active duty, he was employed by American Hospital Corporation (subsequently Baxter Healthcare Corporation) from which he retired in 1991.

As a distinguished member of the Dallas Chapter for more than 30 years, Rollie has held virtually every leadership position in the Order at Chapter, Department, Region and National level.

In 2002, he was installed as our **72nd National Commander-in-Chief**. From 2001-2003, he was President of the Board of Directors of the Youth Development Foundation, Inc. (now known as Youth Enrichment Foundation, Inc. He later served as Chairman of the Council of Past Commanders-in-Chief, from 2008-2011.

Arguably his finest achievements have been while Chairman of the Patriotic Education Committee and *Director* for 18 YLC's, at three different venues, over a space of thirteen years. His first Southwest Youth Leadership Conference was held at Fort Hood, Texas, in 1998, attended by 84 outstanding high school Juniors.

Rollie founded the Texas Patriotic Education Foundation, Inc, in 1997, which became a 501(c)(3), non-profit corporation in 1998. He has continued to serve on the Board of Directors of TX PEF, Inc, from 1997 until the Present. In 1999, Dallas billionaire, H. Ross Perot, Sr, pledged to donate \$750,000 to MOWW's YLC programs, over a period of six years (\$125,000 per year).

Rollie and his wife, Jean Ann (Olson) Stevens have three children, and three grandchildren. They live in Corinth.

Colonel Cliff Way, US Air Force

Colonel Cliff Way, Jr, graduated from Syracuse University



with a degree in Industrial Management & Transportation. He was a member of Scabbard & Blade Honor Society and joined the United States Air Force in 1954. He is a graduate of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, the Air War College, and the National Defense University.

Cliff served on active

duty as a Navigator and Squadron Adjutant with the 96th Air Refueling Squadron (USAF's Strategic Air Command), flying in KC-135 aerial tanker aircraft.

From 1959 through 1984 Cliff served in the 512th Airlift Wing as an Instructor Navigator in C-124s, and later as the Reserve Wing Procurement Officer at Carswell Air Force Base. He retired from the U.S. Air Force Reserve in 1984.

He served as the Senior Officer-in-Charge for the City of Dallas Emergency Office and as the Dallas-area Instructor for the National Defense University Course. In the private sector, he was a Manufacturing and Financial Planning Manager at Texas Instruments until his retirement in 1998.

Cliff joined the Dallas Chapter of MOWW, in 1979, and has held virtually every leadership position at the chapter, state, region and national level, including many years of additional volunteer duties as Chairman of the Dallas Veterans Day Parade, Director of the Dallas Chapter Youth Leadership programs and Coordinator of all JROTC awards.

As Chairman of the Chapter Activities Committee, he won **Best Large Chapter in the Nation** award, twice, and put the chapter in position to repeat as winners for the next 14 consecutive years. In 2010, Cliff was installed as the **80**th **National Commander-in-Chief of our Order**.

Cliff, and his first wife, Jackie, were married for 56 years and had three children, eight grandchildren, and four great grandchildren (all their grandchildren have attended one of our Youth Leadership Conferences).

Cliff later met and married his current wife, Wanda, and they have just celebrated their third wedding anniversary. Their home is in Dallas.



1) When contacted by the Calling Committee you must confirm that you are (or are not) attending, for us to give the Kitchen a Headcount


2) If you did not receive a call, you may confirm your attendance by contacting John Wagner at jhwagner62@sbcglobal.net.


THE US INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY

Intelligence has been called the second oldest profession. In Numbers 13, the Bible describes one of the first recorded intelligence collection events in history when Moses directed Joshua to lead spies into the promised land.


In the Revolutionary War, General Washington cre-

ated the Culper Spy Ring (1778-1783) in and around New York to help defeat the British. After the revolution, intelligence was collected during each following war, but these efforts were mostly tactical and were demobilized after each conflict.



In the Civil War, photo imagery intelligence was used by union forces with observation balloons. The Office of Naval Intelligence was founded in 1882 as the first permanent intelligence agency, followed in 1885 by the Military Intelligence Division. The predecessor of the FBI was founded in 1908.

In World War II, the Office of Strategic Services be-



came the forerunner of the CIA and State Department's INR. DIA was created after the failure of the Bay of Pigs invasion to consolidate military intelligence. As more threats have evolved, more intelligence capabilities are needed. After 9/11, the Department of Homeland Security and

Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) were formed.

Each person authorized access to intelligence must

undergo a background check or investigation to obtain a security clearance. The three intelligence classifications are: Confidential, Secret, and Top Secret.



All military officers are required to hold at least a Secret clearance and all intelligence personnel (officers and enlisted) must hold a TS clearance with a Special Background Investigation and often have Sensitive Compartmented Information (SCI) access.

SCI access is required for Code Word intelligence access at the TS level. SCI access requires a higher level of background screening. The level of clearance needed is determined by job requirements of the position one holds in the military, government, or the project/equipment one is working on. Not everyone who applies for a clearance is able to pass the background check or investigation. Some elected officials hold or have held clearances only because of their elected positions, not because they passed their background checks. Enlisted military personnel with duties working on classified weapon systems/projects or working with classified materials also have security clearances.

Many government officials, defense contractors, and university researchers also have security clearances depending on their jobs or duties.

It is a felony to mishandle classified information and violators are subject to severe penalties. Since the 9/11 terrorist attacks, the number of security clearances have tripled, and with more security clearances, there have been more security breaches.

The Intelligence Community (IC) has incredible ca-



pabilities, and when used properly, intelligence is a force multiplier to the US military and decisionmakers. However, most Americans should not have knowledge or access to that information. The methods and sources of obtaining the intelligence is sometimes more important than

the intelligence collected.

Only the highest government officials, IC personnel, and military officers have access to extremely sensitive information, and the DNI usually has more information than any other American. While the IC does not always come to the correct deduction, manipulation or interference with intelligence is strictly prohibited.

Most Americans will never know the threats elimi-

nated, actions not taken, and the attempts to undermine our country's policies and values which are prevented by the IC.
