Patriot Paws now has chapters in 33 states and has placed over 120 dogs, here in Texas. In Lori's own words, "we owe the veterans far more than we can ever repay, but we're doing what we can, four paws at a time".


Where were You in 1968?



GEN Gordon Sullivan, US Army (Ret)

MG Clayton Hutmacher, US Army (Ret)

GEN Gordon Russell Sullivan, the 32nd Chief of Staff of the

Army and a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. will be our Guest Speaker on **5 April 2019**.

In addition to his service as Army Chief of Staff, he also served as acting Secretary of the Army. General Sullivan is a former President and Chief Executive Officer of the Association of the United



States Army (AUSA), headquartered in Arlington, Virginia, a position he held for 18 years.

Born in Boston, Massachusetts and raised in Quincy, he was awarded a Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Norwich University and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Armor.

During his army career, Sullivan served as: Assistant Commandant, United States Army Armor School at Fort Knox, KY; Deputy Commandant, United States Army Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, KS; Commanding General, 1st Infantry Division (Mechanized) at Fort Riley, KS; Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Plans; and Vice Chief of Staff of the United States Army. His overseas assignments included four tours in Europe, two in Vietnam and one in Korea.

General Sullivan retired from the Army in 1995, after more than 36 years of active service. He is the co-author, with Michael V. Harper, of *Hope Is Not a Method* (Random House, 1996), which chronicles the enormous challenges encountered in transforming the post-Cold War US Army through the lens of proven leadership principles and a commitment to shared values.

He has served as the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Norwich University, the Army Historical Foundation, and the Marshall Legacy Institute, as well as a member of the Army Advisory Board, and a Life Trustee of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute.

In addition to his many awards on active duty, he is also the recipient of the West Point Association of Graduates' prestigious *Sylvanus Thayer* Award and a member of the Sergeants Major Academy's *Hall of Honor*.

Major General Clayton Hutmacher will be our Guest

Speaker on <u>7 May 2019</u>. He entered military service as a Private in the US Marine Corps, and transferred to the Army, after being accepted into the Officer Flight Training program. Hutmacher was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant of Aviation in 1987. He retired in 2018,



having served 40 years in uniform.

He commanded at every level from Company to Regimental Commander, during three tours with the 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment, ultimately serving as the Commanding General of the US Army Special Operations Aviation Command. Early in his career, he commanded aviation assets of the Army's covert *Delta Force*.

The US Army Special Operations Command (USASOC) is the Army component of the Joint US Special Operations Command (JSOC). USASOC is one of the most diverse organizations in the US military, bringing a broad range of combat skills to support Geographic Combatant Commanders and Ambassadors, worldwide.

USASOC is located at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Florida. Their fundamental mission is to organize, train and equip Army Special Operation Forces units, and to deploy them worldwide to meet war plans.

A native of Wenatchee, Washington, he was awarded a Bachelor's degree in Aerospace Management from Embry Riddle Aeronautical University in Atlanta, GA; a Master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the US Naval Command and Staff College, in Norfolk, VA; and a Master's Degree in Strategic Studies from the US Army War College in Carlisle, VA.

Upon retiring, he became the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Special Operations Warrior Foundation nonprofit organization founded in 1980 to provide college scholarships and educational counseling to the surviving children of Special Operations personnel killed in the line of duty.

MG Hutmacher and his wife, Amy, reside in Tampa, FL.

Last Month's Guest Speaker

The Silent Service

Lieutenant (US Navy) Tom E. Meyers pulled the curtain back from the secretive world of the US Nuclear Submarine Navy. It is a life style to which only a special bred are able to adapt and endure.

In addition to the claustrophobic atmosphere aboard a submarine, there is the knowledge that once submerged, the sub will not surface for as many as three to six months.

Tom was an honor graduate of the US Naval Academy, which led to his selection by the famously demanding, ADM Hyman Rickover, to



join the Silent Service. He spent the next seven years serving aboard Nuclear Ballistic Missile and Nuclear Attack submarines.

Tom's slideshow revealed insights into the mystical world of the submariner. Although the boats have grown enormously since the early years, they still have the feeling of narrow corridors and cramped accommodations.

Lengthy deployments in close living and working proximity cause officers and crew to develop a familiarity which is vastly different from the strict discipline of traditional combat forces.

Tom's briefing concluded by covering the superiority of US nuclear subs over those of our potential rivals. Our ability to operate swiftly and silently underwater continues to exceed the technological capabilities of virtually all the other navies of the world.
