Deadline: December 2025

DOD requires new military ID's.

All retired military personnel and dependents will need

to get a new military retiree ID card as soon as possible. DOD has announced phase-out date December 2025 for the existing cards. After that date, personnel with the old ID cards will not be allowed to gain entry to a military base, use military



medical facilities, commissaries, or post exchanges. JRB-NAS, Ft. Worth (formerly Carswell AFB) will issue new ID's, but you must schedule an appointment. Check to determine the necessary documents you need, as the requirements have changed.

An Update - with just a skosh TMI.

Former Chapter and current Region VIII Vice Commander, Chuck Daniels reports that his right knee is fine. He had the left knee replaced in October. In June, he developed a serious infection in the bones in the left knee. The infection spread into the left leg tissue as well.

On June 26th the left knee prosthesis was removed and replaced with temporary antibiotic infused spacers, so that he would be able to walk.

After 3 days in the hospital, receiving IV antibiotics, he was sent home with an IV line installed, which requires daily infusions.



He reports that the first couple weeks, after the surgery, were tough. Due to the infection, he slept a lot, sometimes 12-15 hours per day.

This did not leave a great deal of time for anything else, so he apologizes if he owes you an answer or an action. Please resend any emails to him if that is the case.

Chuck said:" I am now mobile and cleared to drive. I am starting to resume my duties, and I appreciate your understanding. Thank you for your calls and text messages".

Know Your New Companions

Travis R. Allison, LCDR, US Navy (Fmr)

Travis Allison is a native of Houston, Texas. He grad-



uated from Texas A&M University in 2002. earning **BBA** degree Finance and, later a commission in the US Navy. He served 13 years on active duty as a Naval Aviator flying the F/A-18 (Hornet and Super Hornet). He deployed on the USS Enterprise

(CVN-65) and USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN-71) in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF), Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF) and Operation Inherent Resolve (OIR).

Travis graduated from the elite US Navy Fighter Weapons School (TOPGUN). After graduation from TOPGUN, he returned to Naval Air Station Oceana, Virginia Beach, VA, to be a Strike Fighter Weapons Instructor at the prestigious US Navy Strike Fighter Weapons School.

Before leaving active duty service, he earned his MBA from The College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Travis moved to Dallas, TX in the summer of 2015, with his beautiful wife, Cameron, and 2 lovely children, Aubrey and Hall. At the termination of this assignment, he was awarded the Joint Service Commendation Medal for his actions in Iraq.

NOW IS THE TIME FOR POLICYMAKERS TO RE-CONSIDER UNIVERSAL MILITARY SERVICE

The US military needs adequate manpower to ensure American continued superpower dominance. Today our armed forces are not meeting their recruiting goals. Additionally, 77 percent of eligible America youth do not meet DOD recruiting standards the military services have set because the youth have a history of drug use, criminal backgrounds, being medically, or academically unqualified. Lastly, only nine percent of the eligible Americans would desire to serve in the military according to a DOD survey. This is the most severe military recruiting crisis since the draft ended in 1973. Pentagon officials are so concerned, they now question the sustainability of an all-voluntary military. Only 23 percent of young Americans between 17-24 are qualified to serve without a waiver.

Parents are the primary influence of youth recruitment, and middle-class parents often want their children to attend college instead of joining the military. Confidence in US government institutions has also declined to historic lows. Army recruiting is 40 percent of its FY 2022 recruiting goal, USCG is 55 percent of its goal, the USAF is 4,000 airmen below its goal, and the USN is 6,000 below its goals. Only the Marines and Space Force are likely to meet their recruiting goals. The Army National Guard is just below its number, while the ANG is 4,000 below goal. The Reserve components are also short of their recruiting goals.

Unless the US accepts a smaller military, there seem to be three possible fixes, but only one viable solution. The military can lower its standards; shorten enlistments and increase pay and bonuses; or have conscription. Mandatory universal military service seems to be the only satisfactory solution to the nation's recruiting crisis. Lowering standards may increase numbers of recruits but hurt the readiness of the military and exacerbate the recruiting issues down the road. Incentives and increasing pay are traditional solutions but are not working. The \$33 Trillion US debt is so large the country will only be able to pay 80 percent of the Social Security benefits by 2035, if fixes are not made. Our budget deficits and debt make increasing military pay less likely under current projections.

Poor policy decisions have led to increases in inflation which have resulted in rising interest rates. *The interest on our debt is expected to be greater than the current defense budget by 2025.* The US should seriously consider returning to having a mandatory universal military service requirement for men and women to help offset recruiting shortfalls, as the US debt burden will no longer support an all-volunteer military.

There are various arguments against conscription. The strongest argument against it is the lack of political will, as the Congress and Senate may not support an unpopular draft despite the need to do so. There are multiple arguments in favor of universal military service. Universal military service would help American youth become better citizens, by teaching them government, history, and US traditions. These subjects are not being taught well in high schools. They can also learn life and vocational skills. Many adversaries and allies have compulsory service including China, Russia, Israel, Sweden, Norway, Finland, and Switzerland. Having a Universal Military Service requirement would strengthen our national security and allow the US to rapidly mobilize its citizen reserve population, to deal with the significant threats our nation faces.

Global stability depends upon a well-manned, competent, and well-equipped US military.


