Our Senior Vice Commander Allen Clark has asked for




volunteers to become a coordinator in one of several areas. These positions are critical to our missions and will help us achieve the top large chapter in the nation position again. Additional volunteers are needed to

#### Admiral John Richardson, U.S. Navy (Ret.), US Naval

Academy (Class of 1982), served as the 31<sup>st</sup> Chief of Naval Operations from 2015 until his retirement in 2019. He previously served as Director of the Navy's Nuclear Reactor Program.



During his career, he held command at every level of the submarine force. He holds

Masters Degrees from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, and the National War College. He serves on the board of Boeing and numerous other commercial and non-profit organizations.

ADM Richardson will address the threats to vital US national security interests posed by the challenge of China and the acute threat of a resurgent Russia. While US National Strategy integrates the traditional elements of national power, it is the military that is the ultimate guarantor of national security.

As the Chief of Naval Operations, ADM Richardson helped shape the Navy we have today, and as a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, he served as the naval advisor to the President of the US and Secretary of Defense.

# **National Defense and Homeland Security**

## INTELLIGENCE CLASSIFICATION, HANDLING, AND SECURITY

The Director of National Intelligence (DNI) is the



head of the US Intelligence (D11) is the head of the US Intelligence Community (IC), and all 18 intelligence agencies of the IC report to the DNI.

The IC classifies sensitive information as intelligence and uses three levels of classification: **CONFIDENTIAL, SECRET,** and **TOP SECRET**. Each level of classification has increasingly stricter handling requirements, and every classified document (assessments, books, briefs, estimates, photographs, publications, reports, and studies) has clearly marked classifications at the top and bottom of each page.

Any notes written about that document must also be labeled (Top and Bottom) with the highest level of classification in the note. Classification is determined by the intelligence originator, and is written in large, bold font, in red capitalized letters. Each section of a classified document is labeled with the classification of that section.

**Confidential** sections have a (C) before that section of the document which contains information that may <u>possibly</u> cause danger to national security with unauthorized release. **Secret** sections have an (S) before that section of the document which contain secret information that <u>may</u> cause "serious" damage to national security with illegal release.

Top Secret sections have (TS) before that section of



the document that contains information which <u>would</u> cause "exceptionally grave damage to national security" with an illegal leak. Having the same clearance level as the intelligence does not necessarily grant access to the classified material. The IC restricts access to classified docu-



ments based on a "*need-to- know*" which protects sources, methods, and actions related to collecting the intelligence. Access is restricted to those with the proper security clearance and the

need-to-know. Top Secret intelligence is restricted to those with Special Access Program or a Sensitive Background Investigation, and usually has Codeword access. Code words are classified at the same level of the compartmented information to which it allows access.

All TS intelligence must stay in a Sensitive Compart-

mented Information Facility (SCIF), and it is a felony offense to remove TS intelligence or notes from a SCIF without authorization. IC personnel work in SCIFs



in secure spaces. Access is controlled by armed guards, electronic surveillance, passwords, badges, key cards, and other restrictive access measures. All classified materials must be securely stored in locked areas, and personnel with clearances receive annual briefings on storage, dissemination, and handling of classified material. IC personnel have the strictest requirements for handling classified data, then defense contractors and scientists, and finally elected or appointed Senators, Congressmen, and staff. Some elected individuals would not qualify to have a security clearance except for being elected to office.

Presidents, VPs, and the DNI may declassify infor-



mation before a declassification date. IC personnel and Federal agents are the <u>only</u> persons authorized to handle classified papers outside a SCIF.

#### General Mac has slipped the surly bonds of Earth.

Dallas Companion Ben Cervin has advised me that

Major General Robert W. McDonald, better known as "General Mac" to his military friends, left this world on an eternal flight on 30 Jan 22. He was 93.

Upon graduation from Texas Tech in 1951, Mac enlisted in the US Air Force and trained



at Webb AFB in Big Spring, TX, to fly F-80 and F-86 fighters at the speed of sound.

He later joined the Texas Air National Guard to continue his love of flying and in 1955 while still a pilot in the Texas Air National Guard he became an employee of Atlantic Richfield Company (ARCO). In 1979, he founded Liberty Natural Gas Company, connecting Texas gas wells with major pipelines.

General Mac served as the Director of Operations for the Texas Air National Guard, then served as Commander of the 181st Tactical Squadron, Vice Commander of the 136th Tactical Airlift Wing and ultimately, Commander of the Texas Air National Guard in 1983.

General Mac retired from the Military in 1989 and in 1999 he was inducted into the Hall of Honor at the Texas Military Forces Museum at Camp Mabry, in Austin, TX.

He was a Companion of the Dallas Chapter of MOWW for 25 years.
