His service Awards and Decorations include:





Companion Obituary

LT (JG) Hal Winfield Padgett, Jr.



Fellow companion Hal Winfield Padgett, Jr. passed away on March 6, 2024, at age 78, after a long and brave battle with the rare disease, Progressive Supranuclear Palsy, or PSP. Win was born in Dallas on April 26, 1945. He was the only child of Hal Winfield Padgett and Marion Collins Padgett. He was part of the Holy Trinity Catholic community, attended Country Day School of Dallas and graduated Jesuit High School, Class of '63. Win spent a year at The Lawrenceville School in New Jersey, before becoming a proud Princeton University graduate in 1968 with a BA in Philosophy. Having enrolled in Navy ROTC training at Princeton, Win's duties began as the Vietnam war was raging. He served with distinction aboard destroyers in the Western Pacific and South China Sea. His leadership and communication experience was invaluable when Win returned to Dallas to assist in the family business. Win absolutely loved serving his family's customers at Padgett Printing Company, established 1903.

He excelled in the printing business, assuming industry leadership capacities as President of the Printing Industries Association of Texas in 1992-1993, and as Vice Chairman, Government Affairs for the Printing Industries of America from 1994 to 2000. Civic service was Win's love-language. Among many Dallas causes for which he gave his time, Win volunteered generously for SMU, he served Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children for decades, he directed the Dallas Convention and Visitor's Bureau and served the Dallas Chamber of Commerce. Win's love of learning resulted in consistent attendance at SMU post-graduate programs and membership in The Club of Dallas.

With his intelligence, disarming personality and abject love of the greatest game, Win became a considerable figure in the world of golf, cheerfully serving as a USGA Committeeman for over 30 years. Win served as Rules of Golf official at The Masters and other important golf tournaments around the USA. Before his total immersion in the world of golf, Win took flying lessons, secured his private pilot license and purchased his first airplane. His flight instructor introduced Win to another student and licensed pilot, Miss Nancy Greer. She was charmed by the young gentleman's thoughtful kindness, hallmarked by an unmatched smile and a keen sense of humor. Win and Nancy's mutual passion for flight led to a romance that began appropriately at Love Field! Win and Nancy were married in 1975. Their daughter and only child, Lauren Nicole, was born in 1980. Enroute to one of Win's golf trips touring courses in up-state New York, Win and Nancy stopped in Camden, Maine. Falling in love with the town and a beautiful old cottage with a breathtaking view, the Padgetts ended their flying days so they could enjoy 41 years of lovely summers at their shoreline home in Camden, known as The Rock.

Win Padgett was a legendary friend. On the occasion of his 70th Birthday, Nancy and Lauren secretly collected over 100 letters from Win Padgett's wide array of fans, which were copied and bound in a leather book, appropriately called The Nicest Man Any one of those heartfelt pages could be included as a tribute to Win's life well-lived. CC Young Senior Living Center provided the wonderfully skilled-nursing care that allowed Win to bear his last years with grace and good humor, even as his health deteriorated. Win's friendship with Jesus and the consistent prayers from Win's BHGC bible study confirm Win Padgett now rests with the Lord. Win is survived by Nancy Greer Padgett, and their daughter, Lauren Nicole Padgett as well as the family of Win's deceased cousin, Donald F. Padgett, which now includes Don's wife, Sue, and their three children, Elizabeth, Allan, David. Win is also survived by his nephew, Tony Greer.

The Memorial Service will be held at Christ the King Catholic Church on Tuesday April 2, 2024. The United States Golf Association has established the H. Winfield Padgett Jr. Fund with USGA matching to honor and celebrate Win's life, character, and passion for golf history. 
The family is also establishing the Win Padgett Tribute Fund, to support research into PSP and other prime of life brain diseases at www.curepsp.org.

National Defense Report

US NATIONAL SECURITY CONCERNs ABOUT ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is machine technology involving theory and computer systems which perform human tasks. AI adopts decision-making computations, visual, speech, and language discernment. It also imitates human intelligence by performing tasks faster and at times solves problems based on information it gathers. AI analyzes large amounts of data to reduce response times for cybersecurity, business, and defense applications. Yesterday's science fiction is becoming today's reality.



China, Russia, Iran, and North Korea are some of the state actors engaging in a race to improve and increase their AI capabilities. Each of these state actors is developing AI to attack the US. American ships, troops, cities, and ports are at risk. US and Chinese military officials have voiced alarm that increased use of AI systems may lead to accidental or unintended clashes increasing the risks of escalation. China has recently developed unmanned military drones which can launch missiles without human control. China's latest military drone is the Wing Loong I-D. It is armed with a BA-7 laser-guided missile. This air to surface missile is believed to be one of the world's most powerful anti-tank missiles in the world. Their military drones include a stealth battle drone and an unmanned drone bomber.

US Military officials believe that these drones, and drones which have not yet been developed, might lead to an AI race to further develop drone warfare and increase the likelihood of military conflict, or unintentional war. AI also impacts robotics. Robots are already affecting factories and manufacturing today. Tomorrow's AI weapons may be micro machines or enormous numbers of armies, navies, and air forces. Drone warfare has been effective in both the Russia/Ukraine war, and in the Israeli/Hamas War. Despite the computational benefits of AI, there are dangers to its rapid development. AI is currently programmed. The Google Gemini AI education program recently altered American and world history by

making George Washington, Columbus, most revolutionary soldiers, Vikings, and other white Europeans, to become black Africans reflecting the bias of its programmers, and not historical facts. Microsoft is altering English in its software to use PC pronouns. As AI develops, the economies of the world will conceivably reduce employment in almost every occupation, as AI may eliminate most jobs. AI is already used in sensors, medicine, surgical procedures, autonomous weapons, flight simulation, facial recognition, drones, robotics, and tracking technology. It has also been utilized for spreading rumors on the Internet, altering photographs, editing or changing history, and in election interference.



Without careful planning, computer scientists may develop AI which could decide that humans are so greedy, inefficient, and warlike, that they should be terminated. International safeguards must be developed to ensure that bad actors with AI technology do not advance beyond their capability to control AI. Adversaries do not cherish US values, freedoms,



and rights. They could misuse AI to eliminate the US republic. Corporate globalists, UN, and other adversaries favor open borders, and abolishing freedoms US citizens enjoy through the Bill of Rights, Constitution, and Christianity. AI is rapidly changing the world we live in and has altered how war is waged. A major concern for planners is that AI technology changes may increase so rapidly that defensive warfare may not be able to keep up with AI threats.

US defense firms and universities should dramatically increase their efforts to make sure American technology stays in US hands, as they have not maintained the highest levels of security. It is gravely important the US protects its AI dominance, as national security and the republic's future depend upon it.
