"The Veteran's Court System"

We are honored to have Judge John R. Roach, Jr (296th District Court, in McKinney) with us to discuss the Collin County Veterans Court program.

The Veterans' Court is a diversion program Justice-Involved Veterans (JIV) who are facing prosecution. The program is specifically designed assist veterans whose combat-related injury (such as a traumatic brain injury from a roadside bomb) may have led to the

commission of a criminal offense. It is a treatment option that is judicially supervised - with virtually no recidivism.

The Veterans Court is designed to divert these combatrelated, injured service members out of the traditional criminal justice process and into appropriate treatment and rehabilitative alternatives.

raised in Massillon, OH. He graduated from the US Military Academy at West Point in 1985, with a BS degree in Economics and was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant

in the Field Artillery. He later

earned a Master of Science in Sys-

tems Management from the Uni-

versity of Southern California.



His first assignment was to the US Army Jump School, Ft. Benning, GA. He attended exactly 30 years, to the month, after his father qualified to be a paratrooper in the famous 101st Airborne Division, during the Korean War.

Captain Jeffery Butcher was born in Tampa, FL and

After the Artillery Officers Basic Course, Jeff was assigned to Augsburg, Germany, in a Corps Artillery 8-inch howitzer battery, as a battery Fire Direction Officer, Platoon Leader, and Battery Executive Officer. His greatest accomplishment in Germany was meeting, and marrying, the beautiful Captain Barbara Carr!

Upon his return stateside, he branch-transferred to Quarter-master Corps and attended the QM Officers Advanced Course at Ft. Lee VA, after which he was assigned to the Eagle Support Brigade at Fort Campbell, KY, in support of the 101st Airborne Division, initially as the Battalion Operations Officer, later as Commander of the Headquarters Company for the Brigade, which he led during Operation Desert Storm, in 1991. After returning from Desert Storm, he was as an Associate Professor of Military Science at the U. of Arizona.

Jeff resigned his commission in 1992 and took a job as an energy analyst for Fina Oil and Chemical Company of Big Spring, TX. He was transferred to their corporate office in Dallas, to work as a buyer in their procurement office. In 1995, an old battery commander of his helped him land a job with Texas Instruments and he worked in various IT roles for the next 22 years.

He also worked for Raytheon, SBC Wireless, Pepsi, and Hewlett-Packard. In 2017 he made another career change and is now a Financial Advisor for Edward Jones.

His hobbies have always revolved around his children...enjoying them, teaching them, being with them. He has been involved with Boy Scouts for nearly 30 years, serving as a Scoutmaster four times along the way.

Like Barbara, he is a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and has held numerous leadership roles. He is currently serving as the Bishop for the 7th Ward in Plano.

Barbara Carr Butcher was born in Aurora, Colorado, but



raised in Midwest City, OK, just outside of Tinker AFB. She attended the University of Oklahoma on an Army ROTC scholarship and graduated with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Microbiology. She was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Medical Service Corps.

LT Butcher was an Ambulance Platoon Leader and Company Com-

mander in the 5th Medical Battalion, Fort Polk, LA, from 1980-1982.

Following graduation from the Walter Reed Army Medical Center Laboratory Officer Course; she became a Certified Medical Technologist and was assigned to Raymond W Bliss Army Medical Center, Fort Huachuca, AZ, as a Laboratory Officer.

On 13 June 1988, her husband, Jeff proposed, and she resigned her commission. Since leaving the Army, she has devoted her life to supporting her husband and raising their children. She has spent 20 years in service to the Boy Scouts and her most prized awards are her 6 Eagle Scout Mentor pins. Four of her sons are Eagle Scouts. She currently serves as a Genealogy Merit Badge Counselor and a Cub Scout Wolf Den Leader.

For over 30 years, Barbara has been a Mentor for the Sudden Arrhythmia Death Syndrome Foundation. She has a heart defect called *Long QT Syndrome* and volunteers to help others learn how to live with this condition.

As a Family History Consultant. she volunteers at the Family History Center in Plano and teaches genealogy classes at the Plano Senior Center. Chinese Deception Strategy

The most emphasized strategy in Chinese literature from Sun Tzu to Mao Zedong is deception, and many U.S. China experts have not recognized this strategy. Most countries use deception to conceal their strategic or tactical intentions, rather than luring their enemies to take action in a certain way. The Chinese use deception to entice the enemy to act in a predictable way that the Chinese expect or want their enemies to act. Secrecy is a key element to the success of this strategy, and it may be easier to obtain in a homogeneous totalitarian state like communist China.

China desires to replace the U.S. as the preeminent world

superpower by 2049 and dominate the U.S. – militarily, economically, and politically. It is continuing to grow economically, strengthen its military, increase its technological capabilities, and gather intelligence, by using ma-




nipulation, subterfuge, espionage, and theft. Both U.S. business leaders and political officials have knowingly or unknowingly assisted China's efforts. The Chinese are accomplishing their goals by taking advantage of the U.S. because our leaders' desire to have access to the huge Chinese population.

China believes economic progress is a measure of natural resource development, and technological modernization. The Chinese see economic power as a key indicator of geopolitical strength that will eventually lead to unipolar world power supremacy. Using its trading and business relationships, China is concealing its true military, economic, and political intentions.



As Dr. Michael Pillsbury explains in his book, <u>The Hundred-Year Marathon</u>, <u>China's Secret Strategy to Replace America as the Global Superpower</u>, 'America has shown little awareness of this threat and even less desire to confront it.' Many intelligence officials believe China is ahead of its goals. Using its economic might, China may achieve many of its goals not with traditional military victories, but through financial penalties and economic coercion.

Maintaining global economic, military, and political dominance continues to be in our nation's strategic best interests.

Furthermore, the Chinese have not yet paid any price for their deception. China is expanding in the South China Sea. There are 240,000 Chinese students studying in the U.S. The Chinese control the US pharmaceutical market.

"For decades, the U.S. government gave sensitive information to China." U.S. political leaders and intelligence officials are now waking up to the reality that the Chinese appearance of being weak has been a deception.


