### The Heroes of Roberts Ridge: **Predators in Afghanistan**

Lt Gen John Campbell USAF (Ret) will present a comprehensive briefing and Visual Presentation about the evolution of the armed Predator and how it saved American lives in the "Battle of Robert's Ridge". Last summer, two Medals of Honor were awarded for action in the Battle. Lt Gen Campbell will tell the story of that battle, why it took 15 years to recognize those heroes, and how an innovation in warfare saved lives and resulted in the award of those medals.

### Lt Gen Campbell retired from the

US Air Force after a 32-year career. In his last military assignments, he served as Commander, 31<sup>st</sup>Fighter Wing, Aviano, Italy:



Commander 325th Fighter Wing, Tyndall Air Force Base, FL; Deputy

Director of Operations, Joint Staff, the Pentagon; and Associate Director of Central Intelligence, CIA, Langley Va. Prior to his Washington assignments, he served as an F-15 and F-16 fighter pilot and commander, including assignments in Saudi Arabia, Germany, and Italy. He is the recipient of the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Air Medal, and CIA Distinguished Service Award, National Reconnaissance Distinguished Service Medal and National Security Award.

Today, General Campbell serves on numerous boards and community organizations. He resides in McKinney with his wife, Marky. They have three children and five grandchildren.

### Commander's Corner

### SPONSORSHIP OF APPLICANTS

MY FELLOW COMPANIONS. What does it really mean to sponsor an Applicant for Membership? What is the difference between Perpetual and Annual Membership? Why are these questions important to your Chapter and should be important to you?

Sponsoring an Applicant The MOWW National Policy Manual reads "By taking the Order's Oath, every Companion pledges to personally recruit, retain and facilitate the involvement of new Companions". In layman terms, when you have recruited and stood with your applicant at the Induction Ceremony, your responsibility is not finished. Many Companions lose interest in participating because they are left to their own devices to make friends, establish camaraderie, and find their place in the Chapter. Your Applicant is now Your Companion. Call and ask if Your Companion is coming to a Meeting. Introduce Your Companion to other Companions. In other words, make Your Companion know that it was not a mistake to join one of the best Chapters in the Nation. Remind them of our commitment to serve our Community.

Perpetual vs. Annual Membership Every \$40 Annual payment made to National HQ, stays at HQ. HQ does not share with the Chapter. To the contrary, when a one-time \$350 Perpetual fee is paid, HQ invests a portion of that money, and *every year* thereafter (even after the Perpetual Companion's demise), HQ calculates the return on its investments and returns a substantial percentage (%) to the Chapter for its operations. In other words, IT IS A GIFT TO THE CHAPTER THAT KEEPS ON GIVING *FOREVER* TO CARRY OUT OUR OUTREACH PROGRAMS TO THE COMMUNITY.

Furthermore, as time goes by, e-mail and residence addresses change, and Companions forget to notify HQ. In either event, if the Annual Renewal Fee is not paid for any reason, HQ will remove the member's name from the rolls, without notice & cancel the membership. If a Companion wants to remain as a Companion, he or she must start all over by finding a Sponsor, completing an Application and paying the Application Fee. All these issues are resolved by simply being a Perpetual Companion.

I urge every Annual Companion to upgrade to Perpetual Status this year, and when you recruit Applicants, explain these facts.

I hope to see you on Tuesday, 3 September, for camaraderie, a good lunch, and your support as we honor YLC and ROTC Students, today, who will be the Leaders of our Great Country tomorrow.

### KNOW YOUR COMPANIONS

### **LCDR Harry Chris, US Navy**

Lieutenant Commander Harry Chris was born in Beau-



mont, Texas, in 1938. He is a Native son of Texas; however, he was raised in the swampland of Jeanerette, in deep south Louisiana.

Harry attended high school in Jeanerette and that same year he applied for and received a full Navy ROTC scholarship to attend Tulane University, in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Harry graduated in June 1961 with both a Bachelor and a Master's degree of Architecture. He was commissioned as an Ensign in the US Navy and was immediately assigned to the west coast aboard the aircraft carrier, *USS Yorktown* (*CVS10*), "*The Fighting Lady*" of WWII fame.

During the next three years, he completed two 18-month deployments, first to the Far East where he spent 18 months assigned as an engineering officer; followed by a second 18-month deployment as a gunnery officer.

Following his duty in the Far East, [then] Lieutenant Chris was assigned as an associate professor in the Navy ROTC Department at the University of Texas, in Austin. Harry spent two years teaching courses in Naval Weapons and Naval History to future Naval officers.

In June 1966, Harry resigned from active duty and transferred from the regular US Navy to a US Naval Reserve unit. He served an additional 10 years in the Naval Reserves before resigning his commission, at the rank of Lieutenant Commander, and entering the corporate world.

Harry has resided in Dallas since October 1969. In 1979, he founded CCI, a national architectural firm, specializing in the design of country clubs and golf courses. He sold the firm in 2014.

In 1984, he founded, owned, designed, built, and operated the *Park City Club*, Preston Center, Dallas, Texas, current **Home of the Dallas Chapter, MOWW**.

### **MAJ Terry Thorsen, US Marine Corps**

Terry Lynn Thorsen was born in Beloit, Wisconsin in



1943. At age twelve, his family moved to Arlington, Texas, when his father was hired bv Chance Vought Aircraft Manufacturing Company. He graduated from Arlington High School and four years later graduated from Arlington State College (now University Texas, in Arlington, receiving a commis-

sion as a Second Lieutenant in the US Marine Corps.

He spent his first three years in the Marines assigned as a Radar Intercept Officer (RIO) in the rear seat of McDonnell Douglas F-4 (*Phantom*) jets. He was then assigned to VMFA-232 (*Red Devils*) squadron, at El Toro Marine Corps Air Station in southern California. The "*Red Devils*" squadron is the oldest and most decorated fighter attack squadron in the Marine Corps and from the time he joined it, he prepared for combat.

On 1 April 1969, the squadron began flying combat sorties throughout I-Corps South Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, the Gulf of Tonkin and some escort missions into North Vietnam. Terry flew 123 combat missions, sixty percent of which were close air support, earning 10 Air Medals, one Bronze Star Award, two Navy Unit Commendations, the Vietnam Service Medal, the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

In civilian life, Terry has been a professional Photographer, a Crime Scene Investigator, a Crime Scene Supervisor, and Director of a Crime Lab, in charge of Quality Control, Safety, Training, and Accreditation.

In 2019, he became a published Author, writing about his USMC experience and his 1969 combat tour in Vietnam. The book is titled, "*Phantom in the Sky: A Marine's Back Seat View of the Vietnam War*", published by the University of North Texas Press and released March 2019.

Terry and his wife, Audriana, live in Mansfield, Texas.




### The focus is on War
