In Memoriam

Maj Gen Harvey McCarter, USAF (1934-2021)

Harvey J. McCarter, 87 of Fairview, Texas, "flew west" on July 14th, 2021, with his wife by his side.

General McCarter was born in Louisburg, KS on February 7, 1934. He lived in Manhattan, KS, from age 8 and attended Manhattan High School, He graduated from Kansas State University



in 1956 with a BS in Electrical Engineering, played baseball, was a member of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity and KSU Air Force ROTC Detachment.

Upon graduation from KSU, he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the US Air Force and was sent to USAF Flight School at Vance Air Force Base, OK, earning his wings in 1958. His Engineering degree earned him an assignment as a Communications and Electronics Officer at an Aircraft Control and Warning Direction Center in Alaska. Upon completion of the Alaska tour of duty in 1959, he was released from active duty and began a career at Boeing Aircraft in Wichita, KS. In 1960, he joined the Kansas Air National Guard at McConnell AFB, where he flew the T-33, F-86L, the F-100C and F-100F combat aircraft.

A Letter to the Editor

Rebuttal to: July's "US Education: A National Security Concern"

Last month there was an article in our newsletter about "Critical Race Theory" that I wanted to address. Background, I am a proud Hereditary member of MOWW for seven years. I didn't serve in the military, but I did have a military-dependent ID card until I was 23 years old. My father was a Lt Col in the Air Force, a master navigator, and a Vietnam veteran. I went to 7 different schools growing up. One elementary in San Antonio, Texas (Dad was in Security Service at Kelly), two junior highs in Germany (Wiesbaden and Ramstein AFB), four high schools in Germany (Ramstein AFB), Belgium (SHAPE), and Nebraska (SAC). I believe this Texas girl served our country too.

Currently, I serve as a School Board Trustee in Coppell ISD. I am in my tenth year, specifically focused on legislative issues and curriculum and instruction. I have testified before the public education committees in both the Texas Senate and the House and the State Board of Education. I do this work for the children of Texas and our North Texas community.

First, Critical Race Theory (CRT) is a framework and /or analytical tool primarily used in university-level courses. Originating in the 1970s, CRT was first used to help law students think critically about the impact of historical and present-day racism on the legal system. In the 1990s, some colleges also started incorporating CRT into their coursework to help aspiring school administrators and teachers better understand inequities in the context of education.

Critical Race Theory is NOT part of the social studies curriculum and has NEVER been part of social studies curriculum in Texas.

Second, the required content for Texas social studies instruction can be found at: Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). It is important to remember that in Texas, the Texas State Board of Education curriculum must be adopted in consultation with stakeholders - educators, parents, and business representatives - and only after public hearings.

Of course, teaching social studies and history will require a discussion about historical instances of racism. This, in turn, often prompts students' questions and requests for additional discussion on how some elements of history continue to play out in our communities. Texas teachers have experience and expertise in managing this conversation.

And finally, as media channels and public members are confusing some key terms, it's important to note that the terms critical race theory and educational equity are not the same and shouldn't be used interchangeably.

Unlike CRT, which is a tool primarily used in higher education institutions, educational equity is a K-12 term referring to federal and state policies and requirements. Specifically, the term is closely associated with "No Child Left Behind" (NCLB) legislation led by former President George W. Bush and signed into law in 2002. This watershed moment in US education policy established clear requirements for school districts to disaggregate achievement data by student groups to address and close achievement gaps.

Additionally, in recent years, the terms *equity work* or diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) have become commonplace in K-12 education. Many districts revisit and renew their local efforts to close achievement gaps as required by the "Every Student Succeeds" Act (ESSA). When signed into law in 2015, ESSA further advanced equity in the US education policy by upholding important protections outlined in NCLB. At the same time, it granted the flexibility to states, in exchange for rigorous and comprehensive state-developed plans designed to close achievement gaps, increase equity, improve the quality of instruction, and increase outcomes for ALL students.

Isn't this what you, as veterans, fought for? Quality for ALL? Every day, I work for kids, all kids. I do not doubt that you do as well. Your grandkids matter. Mine do too.

Please reach out before you buy into political rhetoric. I'm happy to spend time having conversations with our nation's heroes about what I have spent years investing in for all of us.
