Homeland Security:



The Department of Homeland Security

In 2002, the US Department of Homeland Security (DHS) was created, as a response to 9/11. The Homeland Security Act of 2002 combined 22 different federal departments and agencies into an integrated Cabinet level agency. DHS has consolidated multiple agencies and functions into a department which includes more than 240,000 employees. It oversees approximately 187 federal agencies and departments.

DHS is tasked to secure our nation from multiple threats. Its mission is to coordinate "counter terrorism and homeland security threats; secure US borders and approaches; secure cyberspace and critical infrastructure; preserve and uphold the nation's prosperity and economic security; strengthen preparedness and resilience; and strengthen the integrated relationships between and among headquarters offices and operational components to optimize the department's efficiency and effectiveness."

DHS has other responsibilities including: biodefense, security of ports of entry, detection and investigation of child pornography, contraband, drug trafficking, human trafficking, money laundering, domestic and international intelligence activities within the FBI, future generation security technology, investigation of transnational criminal organizations monitoring and intelligence, logistics, and transportation security.

Although DHS is the federal department responsible for homeland security, much of the nation's homeland security activity remains *outside* of DHS. The CIA, DOD, and FBI are not part of DHS. The Department of Health and Human Services is not part of DHS but has a significant role in the medical preparedness and response to homeland security and. The Federal Emergency Management Agency *is* under DHS. It has responsibility for preparedness, response, and recovery from natural and man-made disasters.

Homeland *security* implies the coordination of civilian components of this effort, whereas homeland *defense*, refers to

its military component. The US Northern Command, (USNORTHCOM) is the primary military defender against an invasion of US territory. This command provides mili-



tary support for non-military authorities in the US to protect the territory and national interests of the US, Puerto Rico, Canada, Mexico, and the Bahamas. USNORTHCOM's area of responsibility includes the air, land, and sea approaches to these areas. There are multiple organizations which comprise Homeland Security <u>and</u> Homeland Defense. The National Guard, FEMA, ICE, USCG, Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Agency, Federal Protection Service, Citizenship and Immigration Services, the Secret Service, the Transportation Security Administration, the Civil Air Patrol, and the 14 agencies of the intelligence community (IC) are also part of homeland security.

KNOW YOUR PAST COMMANDERS-IN-CHIEF

LTC Charles S. Chamberlin, US Army

Chuck Chamberlin is the immediate



he immediate Past Commander-in-Chief of the Military Order of the World Wars.

He is a 1960 Distinguished Military Graduate of Texas A&M University, receiving a BS degree in Industrial Engineer-

ing and was commissioned as a Signal Officer in the United States Army. He holds a Master of Business Administration degree from Farleigh Dickinson University.

During his 20 years on active duty Chuck served as a Platoon Leader in the 101st Airborne Division, Ft. Knox, KY; and as a Signal Company Commander in the 10th Special Forces Group in Bad Tolz, Germany and 5th Special Forces Group, Republic of Viet Nam.

He was a Distinguished Graduate of the Signal Officers' Career Course, Ft Gordon, GA, which led to his assignment as a Tactical Officer at the US Military Academy at West Point. From there he became an Exchange Officer assigned to the US Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, CO.

Chuck returned to Viet Nam as MACV J-6, serving as the Signal Battalion XO and Division Signal Officer in the 9th Infantry Division. Following graduation from the US Command & General Staff Course, Ft Leavenworth, KS, he was assigned as an Emergency Action Officer in the National Military Command Center (NMCC) in the Pentagon. He then assumed Command of the Signal Battalion of the 2nd Infantry Division, in the Republic of South Korea.

His final assignment was as a Branch Chief in the Defense Communications Agency, Ft Meade, MD.

Chuck retired in 1981 and became a telecommunications executive for the next 28 years, spending half of that time as the company's Vice President.

He is a Past Commander of the Dallas Chapter of MOWW and has been the Chair of the Council of Area Commanders. He is a recipient of both the Silver and the Gold Patrick Henry Medals.


Chuck and his wife, Adele, live in Fairview, TX.

Captain John Hayes, US Air Force

John Hayes was the Commander-in-Chief of the

Military Order of the World Wars in 2014.

He is a 1967 graduate of Southern Methodist University, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree. While an undergraduate, he was the Corps Commander



of the Arnold Air Society (the Air Force Senior ROTC National Honor Society).

He received a commission in the US Air Force and served on active duty from 1967-1972. He qualified as a pilot in 1968.

John was a C-141 (Lockheed *Starlifter*) aircraft commander at Charleston Air Force Base, SC, and an EC-47 (Douglas *Electric Goon*) Chief Flight Examiner, Instructor Pilot, and Supervisor of Flying at Phu Cat Air Force Base, RVN. He flew 166 combat missions over Vietnam, then resigned his commission.

Following his military service, John became a Braniff and US Airways airline pilot from 1972 to 2005, retiring as a Captain with 24,000 flying hours.

John was the Commander of the Dallas Chapter of MOWW in 2006, and then Commander of Region VIII.

He has also been the Chairman of the Greater Dallas Veterans Day Parade, which is the largest in Texas and one of the largest Veterans Day Parades in the nation.

For many years, he was the Director of the Southwest Youth Leadership Conference at Texas Wesleyan University.

Among his many other awards and decorations, he is the proud recipient of the *Silver Beaver*, the highest honor that can be bestowed on an individual by the Boy Scouts of America. John was an Eagle Scout and is the proud father of an Eagle Scout. His son's Eagle project can still be seen in a picturesque grotto at the Dallas – Fort Worth National Veterans cemetery in Grand Prairie.

John is a recipient of both the Silver and the Gold Patrick Henry Medals. He has been the Military Liaison for US Congressman Kenny Marchant since 2010. Kenny chose not to run for reelection, this year allowing John to finally take a break, travel, and enjoy a life of leisure.

John and his wife, Mary, live in Dallas, TX.

Park City Club Luncheon Guidelines for December


Companions are asked to adhere to Club guidelines.

- 6) Happy a Happy Holiday season


Continue to respect others by maintaining appropriate "Social Distancing".

The End of the Beginning – Korea, 1950

Using maps and photos, Colonel J.P. Hogan demonstrated

a brilliant grasp of the actions that led to the near US disaster in the opening phase of the Korean War.

After the surrender of Japan, at the end of World War II, on 15 August 1945, Korea was divided at the 38th parallel into two zones of occupation, that in 1948, became two sovereign states. North Korean People's Army forces crossed the border and advanced into South Korea on 25 June 1950.


After the first two months of war,

South Korean and US forces on the point of defeat, retreated behind a defensive line known by military historians as the Pusan Perimeter.

In September 1950, General Douglas MacArthur launched an amphibious counter-offensive at Incheon, and cut off the North Korean troops in South Korea.



Those who escaped capture were forced back north. Advancing Allied forces invaded North Korea in October 1950 and moved rapidly towards the Yalu River—the border with China.
