For all of us who served, we are reminded of times in our military service when perhaps we were far from home on Christmas Day itself. On Christmas Day in 1966, I was in a "*safe house*" in Saigon with three young anti-Communist Cambodians, whom I was training for a



clandestine mission into Cambodia. I learned that Bob Hope was at nearby Tan Son Nhut Airbase with his USO show. I was tempted to "desert" my post for a few hours to attend the show and have faith that my charges would still be there upon my

return. But duty called and I remained by myself, with a can of C-rations for my Christmas feast. Years later, in the early 1990s, in Washington DC, I was able to meet Bob Hope, in person, at a fundraiser for the Korean War Memorial.

My spirit is humbled to reflect upon my limited hardship when contrasted with the many Christmases in a lonely Hanoi prison cell experienced by Air Force fighter pilot, Colonel Ken Cordier. Ken would have loved to have had a can of C-rations on those Christmases.(*continued on p.2*)

Know Your Companions

Natan Ton-That, LT, US Army

Senior Vice Commander Natan Ton-That was born in



Natan Ton-That was born in Da Nang, in Central Vietnam, on *Veterans Day*, November 11, 1967. His name means: "*A Gift from God*." His father was a chief mechanic for the US Navy Seabees in Da Nang.

After the fall of the Republic of South Vietnam on April 30th, 1975, the local Communist leaders in Da Nang, who knew of his father's connections to the US military,

confiscated his business, his property, his money, his tools, and his permit to travel.

After 3 years under gruesome rule by the North Vietnamese Communists, his father planned an expensive and dangerous escape to freedom, by boat. By the grace of God, the dozen families in the boat survived a vicious monsoon storm in the South China Sea and were rescued by Chinese fishermen, who transported them to Hong Kong.

With the assistance of the Catholic Church, his family located a distant relative living in America, who agreed to be their sponsor. After spending more than six months in a refugee camp in Hong Kong, they arrived in Denver, Colorado. Two weeks later, his father was offered work as an airplane mechanic, in Wichita, Kansas.

Kansas became home, starting in 1979. Natan completed primary and secondary school education there, and then earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in history at Wichita State University. While taking courses to earn a Master's degree, he volunteered for the Peace Corps to "*repay America*." He spent two years in Hungary with the Peace Corps, and then returned to Kansas and completed his Master's program earning a degree in History.

In the winter of 1995, Natan enlisted in the US Army Reserves. After completion of Advanced Individual Training at Fort Sam Houston, in San Antonio, he received a direct commission as a Second Lieutenant.

He was inducted into the Dallas Chapter of the Military Order of World Wars in 2020. His work ethic and enthusiasm became immediately apparent to the officers of the chapter. He was elected to be the Junior Vice Commander in his second year as a Companion. This month, he will be installed as our Senior Vice Commander in preparation for becoming the Commander of the Best Chapter in the Nation, in 2024.

Junior Vice Commander Mark Smits graduated from



Texas A&M University with a Bachelor's degree in Building Construction. At graduation he received the designation of Distinguished Military Student which earned him a Regular Army commission as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Corps of Engineers.

Engineer Officers' Basic course at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, Mark served for four years on active duty, eventually earning the rank of Captain.

Following his resignation from the Army, he became Sales Manager for Abbott Diagnostics. After several years, he was promoted to Vice President of US Services and Support.

In 2008, he became Vice President of Strategic Marketing for Fisher Healthcare. Three years later, he assumed the position of Vice President for Sales and Marketing with NeoGenomics Laboratories. Two years later, he moved to San Diego, where he was the Vice President of Marketing for Quidel, Inc.

In 2015, he returned to Texas and became the small business owner of Smits Ranch, in the city of Milano, TX.

He retired from corporate America in 2015. Since his retirement, Mark has planted a vineyard, learned how to make wine commercially and is now the proud owner of Descarado Winery.

Mark and his wife, Missy, have four adult children, all of whom graduated from Coppell High School.

Their daughter, Meghan Tidwell, teaches at Cottonwood Creek Elementary School. Their sons, Patrick and Bryan, are regional managers for medical sales companies. Their third son, Kevin, recently obtained his firefighter certificate from Texas A&M University.

Over the years, Mark has been active in the Coppell Aggie Club and is currently serving as the Club President. He has also been active in Coppell High School athletics and served as President of the Coppell Cowboy Basketball Booster Club. He also coached youth athletics as part of the YMCA youth program.

OPEN BORDERS: AN INVITATION FOR TERRORISM

The US is one of only three countries in the world with a population exceeding 300 million. It is one of the very few large countries that allows legal immigration but is the *only* large country in the world which does not protect its borders. The US government has a responsibility to protect its borders. It does not need uncontrolled population growth. Customs and Border Patrol (CBP) officials have



stated that Mexican Criminal Cartels now control the southern US border. Millions of migrants have crossed the US borders ille-

gally from more than 160 different countries in the last three years. An illegal alien or migrant is someone who has violated US laws to enter the US, or someone who has overstayed their visa. More migrants have illegally entered the US in the last three years, than the entire populations of 38 states. Illegals put stress on our culture, language, education system, medical care system, housing, and impact lowskilled employment. Each of these areas negatively impact the stability and national security of the US. Most illegals do not speak English, have few technical job skills, or academic degrees. Very few illegal aliens pay Federal Income Taxes. Illegal immigration costs are skyrocketing as are the numbers of illegals within the US, which some estimates say exceed 39.9 million.

Terrorism is another major concern of an open border policy. Special Interest Alien Apprehensions occur when illegals are from countries which encourage terrorism, protect terrorists, or pose a national security threat to the US. These apprehensions have increased dramatically over the past two years. Most Special Interest Aliens have entered the US from the Middle East. CBP data shows over 33,800 came from Turkey, 15,500 from Mauritania, 12,600 from Uzbekistan, 6,300 from Afghanistan, 3,100 from Egypt, 1,600 from Pakistan, 650 from Iran, 530 from Syria, and over 100 each from Lebanon, Jordan, and Iraq. Radical extremist Islamic terrorist organizations backed by Iran like - Hamas, Hezbollah, Islamic Jihad, and Houthi rebels are suspected to have entered the US. Since the 07 October attacks, DOD has reported over 73 attacks on US bases and ships in the Middle East. Aliens from China, Iran, and Russia have also illegally entered the US over the past three years since the current administration decided to pursue an open border policy. Large numbers of illegals on the terrorist watch list have been

captured at the border, but even larger numbers of "gotaways" are suspected terrorists. In February 2023, more illegals on the Terrorist Watch List were captured on the southern border than



were captured in the previous four years, and 211 terrorists on the Watch List have been captured year-todate on our southern border.

FBI Director Christopher Wray has issued a terrorist alert for the US after saying the US has a higher risk of domestic terrorist threats because of the unrest in the Middle East. Wray said, "We assess that the actions of Hamas and its allies will serve as an inspiration the likes of which we haven't seen since ISIS launched its so-called caliphate several years ago." Wray also advised that individuals 'inspired' by foreign terrorists, and radicalized online are the 'greatest threat' to US security. Many analysts believe the recent \$6 billion ransom paid to Iran to release American hostages, will result in more hostages being kidnapped, enabling Iran to conduct more terrorism, proxy wars, and further their nuclear development. The unexpected Hamas terrorist attack in Israel was a massive intelligence failure for both Israel and the US. Open borders are a major national security issue which is not being adequately addressed by Homeland Security or the IC. The longer US borders remain open, the possibility and probability of a terrorist attack within the US increases significantly.
