"Growing Up behind the Iron Curtain"

Ilir Ademaj is a renowned expert on Conflict. He earned



a Bachelor of Arts in Criminology and Law from University of Illinois, Chicago, and a Master degree specializing in Public Management and Leadership from Northern Illinois University in DeKalb.

Ilir is naturalized US citizen and scholar who is actively

involved in educating youth about the evil of Totalitarian governments. He uses his personal experiences to explain life under Communism. At the same time, he proudly portrays Albania's history and breathtaking landscape, which features centuries of glorious Empires and wreckages of civilizations from Alexander the Great to Genghis Khan.

His former Homeland contains some of the most picturesque, untouched mountain ranges overlooking the bright turquoise blue of the Adriatic Sea.

He will share facts and figures concerning historical as well as contemporary information regarding the significance of the entire Balkan region and its role as a strategic buffer on the Eastern edge of NATO. In light of the ongoing war in Ukraine, his insights will shed light on Russia's continuing desire to one day control warm water ports in the Aegean Sea and eventually the Mediterranean.

50th Anniversary Commemoration

3 Million Veterans served in Vietnam (1965-1973)





The Paris Peace Accords were signed on January 27, 1973, marking the end of United States' participation in the Vietnam War and enabling the return of the 591 surviving Prisoners of War. In eight years of US fighting 58,000 US servicemen died and today nearly 1600 remain unaccounted for. Over 600,000 Vietnam Veterans are estimated to be alive today.

On March 21, combined veteran's organizations of the North Texas area will conduct a commemorative event to recognize and honor all those who served during the Vietnam War and their families. This free event is open to the public.



The doors will open at 9:15 am and the ceremony will begin at 10 am. Refreshments provided by Dunkin Donuts.

The National Anthem will be sung by Donald Jones, Dallas Opera-Invited speakers include Dallas Mayor Eric Johnson, Congressman Keith Self, Honorable Allen Clark, and Natan Ton-That. Local artist Colin Kimball will display a collection of portraits of Texas Vietnam heroes. Commemorative lapel pins will be presented to Vietnamera veterans (Nov 1955-May 1975) and surviving spouses.



Admiral John Richardson, U.S. Navy (Ret.), US Naval

Academy (Class of 1982), served as the 31st Chief of Naval Operations from 2015 until his retirement in 2019. He previously served as Director of the Navy's Nuclear Reactor Program.

chusetts Institute of Technology, Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, and the National War College. He serves on the board of Boeing and numerous other commercial and non-profit organizations.

Advocate, has been helping low inveterans come and their families receive free legal representation since 2014. He is a volunteer in the Dallas Volunteer Attorney Program (DVAP). He is also cochair Veterans the Outreach Subcommittee on the Pro Bono Activities Committee of the Dallas Bar Association. The DVAP clinic is the largest legal clinic, serving

as many as 79 veterans and family members. DVAP provides full representation in a variety of cases, including housing, employment, real property, wills, expunctions, non-disclosures, probate, bankruptcy, small business issues, veterans VA benefits, and more. The clinic cannot help with criminal cases, tickets, or fee-generating cases such as personal injury matters.

Chinese Weather Balloons

The Communist Chinese are reportedly upset about a USAF fighter jet shooting down one of their "weather balloons" that violated U S airspace and traversed the North American Continent.



Before it was shot down, it paused over strategic USAF intercontinental ballistic missile sites, a B-2 stealth bomber base, the National Geospatial-Intelligence Agency, and had a slant range to view the Pen-The Intelligence Community (IC) assessed



that the balloon was actually a sophisticated intelligence gathering apparatus that had an array of equipment appearing to have communica-

tion, photographic, listening, recording, signals intelligence, monitoring equipment, radar, and other intelligence gathering devices. SecDef Lloyd Austin said that measures were taken to reduce the effectiveness of the array of intelligence gathering equipment under the balloon.

The IC tracked the balloon from its Chinese launch site and tracked it for its entire flight. After the balloon launched from China, and crossed the Pacific, it first entered US airspace over Alaska, then Canada, before loitering over Idaho, Montana, Kansas, Missouri, and finally South Carolina. A photograph

taken by a USAF U-2 pilot of the balloon shows an array of 16 rectangle shaped boxes the size of a jet airliner, hanging beneath a 200-foottall balloon flying at 60,000 feet.



Some senior officials believe the Chinese are probing US defenses and a USAF general from North American Aerospace Command (NORAD) stated it is opening a new warfare domain that the US did not anticipate, (suborbital, relatively slow-moving, stratospheric balloons).

An F-22 (Raptor) fighter jet used a AIM-9X (Sidewinder) missile to shoot down the balloon off the coast of South Carolina

within the 12-nautical mile US boundary limit.; how-

ever, many military and policy analysts are questioning why the US allowed this Chinese intelligence gathering balloon not be shot down



when it entered Alaskan airspace or reentered US airspace over Idaho or Montana. It was reported that the Biden administration said it was to prevent injury to citizens on the ground, even though Alaska has a population of one person per square mile and Montana has a population of five people per square mile.

A growing concern for US policy makers is the expanding economic, political, and military alliance



between Russia Communist China. General Secretary XI on 21 February 2023 announced he would travel soon to Russia to meet

with President Putin.

China is already purchasing enough Russian oil to counteract US and Western allies export ban on Russian oil. There is speculation from military analysts

that China may soon begin assisting Russia with lethal aid, equipment, and arms for use against Ukraine. China has not condemned Russia for its invasion



despite requests from the President. US companies should reduce their dependency on Chinese manufacturing and its supply chain. The adage 'if we trade with them, they will democratize,' has proven false.

China is not a US competitor; it is an adversary. As China seeks global domination and closer ties to Russia, perhaps the US should be more concerned about upgrading its military preparedness - recruiting, warfighting capabilities, and strategy, with less emphasis on diversity, equity, and inclusion, and other politically correct, but militarily divisive and morale eroding concepts. Our country's focus should never include discrimination in its military, schools, and colleges. Merit should always be the primary criteria for promotions of the most competent.

<u>Neighborhood Watch</u>: **Robert Epstein** is the coordinator for our participation in this year's National




Neighborhood Watch program. Bob will provide tips for us to protect our property and neighborhoods.
