Warfare Distractors: The Next Level

Colonel John Antal's latest book, 7 *Seconds to Die*, is an excellent primer for today's military strategists and for anyone interested in understanding the changing methods of war. John is a military historian, leader-ship expert, and master storyteller.

He served 30 years in the US Army as a combat arms officer. He has commanded

units from platoon through regiment and served on Corps and *multinational* staffs. At the Pentagon, he served as Special Assistant to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and later retired after serving at Fort Hood, Texas, where he was the Operations Officer (G-3) of the 165,000 personnel of III Armored Corps.

In his post-Army career, he has been a military consultant, a video game producer, a magazine editor, a talk show host, and the author of sixteen books and hundreds of articles on military and leadership subjects. He serves on the US Army Science Board educating military leaders on the lessons of recent military conflicts and changing methods of warfare.

and British troops against 120,000 Chinese. The 1st Marine Division was the largest American unit in battle. The division was surrounded and severely outmanned. The fighting was hand to hand, in the mountains, in heavy snow. Temperatures were below zero

National Security'

National Defense Seminars, Part Deux

Season Two, Episode Two of the National Defense Briefing Series will focus on "*Air and Naval Power*" on 18 Sep 22, at 4:00 p.m. in the Heritage Ranch Country Club, 465 Scenic Ranch Circle, Fairview, TX.

Unlike the other services, the Navy has sought to expand its

force structure. However, its previous plan to reach 355 ships collapsed because of high costs and the need to incorporate new technologies, such as unmanned systems.



In FY 2023, Navy active-duty personnel would increase to 347,800. Fleet size would increase to 306. Secretary of Defense Esper outlined a "500+ ship" future fleet described as "an ever-present, resilient, and dominant fighting force."

Carriers and large surface combatants (LSCs) would be cut to pay for *unmanned* vessels, additional submarines, and small surface combatants. Naval aviation, in contrast to the surface and submarine fleets, will continue to be "*manned* platforms."

The Secretary of Defense and the Navy seem to have different interpretations about the future fleet. The new smaller and increasingly *unmanned* 500+ fleet would cost about the same as the current 355-ship fleet.

Admiral Foggo and Major Penny will discuss the impact of



here and other trends in Air and Naval Power to a packed house of military, academic, and corporate personnel, so register early. This series has generated

The Panel for our 18 September 2022, briefing will be:

Admiral James Foggo (US Navy, Ret), a 1981 graduate of

the U.S. Naval Academy. He is also an Olmsted Scholar and Moreau Scholar, earning a Master of Public Administration at Harvard University.

He commanded the attack submarine, USS Oklahoma City (SSN 723) in 1998, which was awarded the

Commander Fleet Forces Command Trophy for being the most improved ship in the Atlantic Fleet.

Ashore, he has served as executive assistant to the Director of naval nuclear propulsion for Western Europe and the Balkans; executive assistant to Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; and executive assistant to the Supreme Allied Commander Europe.

In Naples, Italy, he served as Commander, Submarine Group 8; Commander, Submarines Allied Naval Forces South; and Deputy Commander, US 6th Fleet. Additionally, he was NATO Task Force Commander in Joint Task Force Unified Protector in Libya. During his last European assignment, he commanded the entire US 6th Fleet.

ADM Foggo is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the Chief Executive Officer of the National Cybersecurity Center. He has been a Director of the Defense Information Systems Agency and the National Communications System.

Maj. Heather Renee Penny (USAF, Ret), a defense policy

expert at the Mitchell Institute for Aerospace Studies in Arlington, VA, charged with Air Force issues focused on leveraging the advantage that only aerospace power affords.



She is best known for her role as a USAF lieutenant who was one of two

F-16 (*Viper*) pilots who flew their unarmed planes with the mission of ramming United Airlines Flight 93, before it reached Washington, D.C., during the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001.

In the <u>Washington Post</u>, Penney described her willingness to down Flight 93, saying that "there are things in this world that are more important than ourselves. As complex and diverse as it is, this idea called **America**, binds us together in citizenship, community and brotherhood."

Major Penny was previously the Director of Aviation Training Systems at Lockheed Martin, in Washington, DC, for more than 11 years. For the past 5 years she has been a member of the Board of Directors of Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), an international organization with over 200,000 members, worldwide.



To avoid defeat and annihilation, the Marines decided to break out to the sea and attack in another direction. They fought for seven days, the whole 70-mile trip, at a cost of more than 6,000 men. The Communists lost 50,000 men.

LtCol Michael Menefee, USMC (Ret)



Michael Menefee was inducted as our 69th Chapter Commander. He is a sixth generation Texan who was born in Fort Worth. He attended Texas Tech University for two years and enlisted in the USMC in 1971. Upon graduation from OCS, Sgt Menefee was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant of Marines. After the

Officer Basic course, 2nd Lt Menefee was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, as an 81 mm mortar platoon commander. 1st Lt Menefee completed USMC Mountain Warfare Survival School and Cold Weather Training at Bridgeport, CA, and desert training at 29 Palms, CA. He served in Alaska and aboard two ships in the Pacific.

Capt Menefee transferred to the USMCR and completed multiple USN and USMC intelligence schools to become an Intelligence Officer. He earned a BS from USNY; an MSA from Central Michigan; and a Postgraduate Intelligence Program (PGIP) degree in Strategic Intelligence from the National Intelligence University. He is also a graduate of Amphibious Warfare School, Command and Staff College, and the National Defense University.

Michael served as a Photo Imagery Officer at 4th Marine Aircraft Wing (MAW); and G-2, 2nd MAW. He was a Watch Officer at Fleet Intelligence Center, Pacific. During tours at USCINCLANT and USACOM, Maj Menefee was a briefer, analyst, and Intell Center Watch Officer.

LtCol Menefee participated in intelligence planning Operation's DESERT SHIELD/ DESERT for STORM; UPHOLD DEMOCRACY; multiple noncombatant and embassy evacuations in Africa and Latin America. His final tour was at Joint Staff, J-2, where he was a briefer, Liaison to State Department and CIA, and JCS Crisis Operations Officer for Strategic Warning.

Michael retired in 2001. His awards include a Defense Meritorious Service Medal and a Joint Service Commendation Medal. He also holds multiple professional designations from the College for Financial Planning.

Michael and his wife, Cathy, have been married for 40 years. They have 3 children and a granddaughter. They currently live in Arlington, TX

CPT Allen Clark, US Army (Ret)

Allen B. Clark graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1963 and was commissioned in the Army Corps of Engineers. Two years after his graduation from West Point, Allen volunteered for a tour in Vietnam, where he served as a Military Intelligence officer assigned to the 5th Special Forces Group. He was wounded in an early-morning mortar attack at the Dak To Special Forces camp on June 17, 1967, necessitating the amputation of both legs below his knees. In recognition of his military service, he received a Silver Star for Gallantry in Action, the Purple Heart, and the Combat Infantryman's Badge. He calls it his "Alive Day." God had other plans for him.

While learning to walk on prosthetic legs, Allen obtained an MBA in finance from SMU's Cox School of Business in Dallas, Texas. His first post-graduate position was as an investment manager for Ross Perot. His other private sector experience has spanned oil and gas exploration, real estate marketing, and mortgage lending. He has been vice president of a bank, president of three oil service companies, and co-founder of a real estate investment company in Texas.

In 1981, President Ronald Reagan selected him to be Deputy Administrator for the Department of Veterans Affairs. In 1982, the Texas Republican Party nominated him to run for State Treasurer in a race that was won by former Texas State Governor, Ann Richards.

In 1989, Allen was nominated by President George H.W. Bush and confirmed by the US Senate as Assistant Secretary for Veterans Liaison at the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. In 1991, became the Director of the National Cemetery System.

Last month, he appeared in the West Point Officers Association of Graduates magazine commemorating his 55th Alive Day with a roomful of close family, classmates and

friends.



Allen shared his 80th Birthday and 55th Alive Day with his wife, Linda, Jamie Malakoff, Marshall & Susan Miles, and Reyno & Mary Arredondo. All are West Point graduates, and all are proud Dallas Chapter Companions (recruited by Allen).

UNEXPECTED CONSEQUENCES OF THE RUSSIA-UKRAINE WAR

Before Russia's invasion of Ukraine in February, most analysts thought the Russian military would dominate Ukraine's military in a short war which would result in a Russian victory. Several months into the war, Russia's military is dominant, but their victory is not assured.

Vladimir Putin is the former KGB officer,



he former KGB officer, president, and dictator of the authoritarian government of Russia. Unconfirmed reports state he may have cancer. Putin thought he saw an opportunity to take advantage of a weakened US and a

fractured NATO, but sorely misjudged the resolve of the Ukrainian President Vladimir Zelensky.

The US had just suffered a humiliating withdrawal in Afghanistan and had a deeply divided political electorate. Inflation was increasing because the US had curtailed its petroleum production. It had also increased its deficit by **\$10 trillion**, and the Congress was not focusing on foreign policy.

Putin considers the American president and his foreign policy weak, and his administration's appointees and subordinates even weaker. European nations in NATO

were not funding themselves adequately. Even though US intelligence was telling the world daily that Russian troops were being tactically placed



along the Ukrainian border as a probable prelude to an invasion, the US did little, and NATO did nothing, to prevent Russia from invading. Russia may have thought that with all the military equipment left to the radical [Taliban] Muslim extremists in Afghanistan, (Forbes estimates - \$85 billion) that the US could not afford to send Ukraine massive amounts of military aid without further harming its already damaged economy.

Western intelligence has observed, unexpectedly, that



Russian military leadership has been much weaker and less effective than predicted. Russian conscripts have performed poorly. Russia is still using its WWII strategy of exploiting artillery and missiles to savagely destroy cities, without regard for human life. Most Europeans and Westerners consider this strategy of warfare to be inhumane and uncivilized.

A second unexpected outcome is that Russia's military strategy and tactics have galvanized the Western allies



and NATO to oppose Russia and Putin. Vladimir Putin thought his invasion would weaken NATO, but instead it united it against Russia.

Finland and Sweden have changed their neutrality status and have asked to join NATO because of Russian aggression in Ukraine. Ukraine has

also asked to join NATO.

The third unexpected outcome of the Russian invasion is Russian military losses have been considerably higher than projected. Depending on the source, estimates of Russian losses are: 15 generals and 36,000 men, 1,582 tanks, 3,737 armored personnel carriers, 628 artillery pieces, 217 aircraft, and 186 helicopters.

Another unforeseen issue was the US hoped China

would condemn Russian aggression, but instead they have increased oil purchases from Russia 55 percent.

India has also increased Russian oil imports 10 per-



cent. These oil purchases help Russian oil revenue, providing Russia a long-term ability to outlast Ukraine and Western support.

Oil analysts estimate higher US domestic oil prices (\$100/barrel oil) are providing \$1 billion/week to Putin, while at the same time, the US is sending the Zelensky government \$1 billion/month in military arms. This means the US is inadvertently funding both sides of the conflict!

Lastly, since Russia has cut natural gas supplies, Europe is returning to coal. Three percent of European



energy comes from renewable energy, and electricity is one fifth of the energy needed by the world. The European countries are shifting back to fossil fuels instead of destroy-

ing their economies without energy.
