"The Heroes of Roberts Ridge"

Lt Gen John Campbell, USAF (Ret), will present a compre-



JSAF (Ret), will present a comprehensive briefing and visual presentation about the evolution of the armed **Predator** and how it saved American lives in the "*Battle of Robert's Ridge*". Last summer, two Medals of Honor were awarded for action on Roberts Ridge. Lt Gen Campbell will tell the story of that battle, and why it took 15 years to recognize those heroes. He will explain how an innovation in modern

warfare saved lives and resulted in the award of those medals.

LTG Campbell retired from the Air Force after a 32-year career. In his last military assignments, he served as Commander, 31st Fighter Wing, Aviano, Italy; Commander, 325th Fighter Wing, Tyndall AFB, FL; Deputy Director of Operations, Joint Staff, the Pentagon; and Associate Director of Central Intelligence, CIA, Langley, VA.

Prior to his Washington assignments, he served as an F-15 and F-16 fighter pilot and commander, including assignments in Saudi Arabia, Germany, and Italy. He is the recipient of the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Air Medal, and CIA Distinguished Service Award, National Reconnaissance Distinguished Service Medal and National Security Award.

Today, General Campbell serves on numerous boards and community organizations. He has been an ardent supporter of MOWW and has spoken to multiple groups of YLC students.

"Soft Power" – A Non-lethal Air Force Mission

Most Americans have seen on TV the US Air Force's lethal

application of airpower around the world with precision airstrikes against our enemies. Guided, manned and unmanned weapons are exceptionally devastating! Americans are also familiar with how our AF is quick to respond globally whenever natural disasters strike like hurricanes, tidal waves, fires, etc. What most Americans don't realize is how their AF uses



non-lethal airpower to influence world events. These applications of air power have global reach and are very effective. Our November Presentation by Brig Gen Steve Roser, USAF (Ret), will tell the story of a successful, non-lethal application of airpower during the fall of Iran in 1979.

Brig Gen Roser retired from the United States Air Force in 2009 after serving 29 years, during which time he held numerous command and staff positions. He is a command pilot with over 4,000 hours of flying time in both rotary and fixed wing aircraft. He was the Wing Commander of Bolling AFB, Charleston AFB, and Travis AFB. His awards and decorations include the Distinguished Flying Cross and three Air Medals earned in combat during the Vietnam War, flying the CH-3E.

In 1999, he and his wife were selected for the O'Malley Award as the Best Wing Commander Couple in the Air Force. He was inducted into the Order of the Sword in 2000, the only Brigadier General in AMC to be so honored.

KNOW YOUR COMPANIONS

LTC Walton H. Capps, US Army (1933-2019)

LTC Walton (Walt) Capps, USA, (Ret) graduated from the University of Missouri in 1954 and was commissioned in



Air Defense Artillery.

After entering active duty, in Feb 1955, he was assigned to Ft Sill as an instructor. He soon became fixed and rotary wing qualified as a pilot.

In 1959 he was assigned to US Forces in West Germany and flew in support of V Corps Artillery for most of that tour. He was still stationed in Germany

during the Berlin Crisis and participated in exercises in preparation to repel an invasion through the Fulda Gap.

Walt attended the Advanced Course at Ft Bliss, Texas, and remained there after graduation to serve as a Battery Commander. His unit received orders to proceed to Homestead, Florida to provide Air Defense coordination in preparation for the Invasion of Cuba. Fortunately, Russia chose to withdraw, thus defusing the Cuban Missile Crisis.

After Fort Bliss, Walt was ordered to Viet Nam and was assigned to be the logistics officer (S-4) of the 52nd Aviation Battalion in Pleiku. His was the first American base to be attacked in force, during the early stages of the war.

During the Tet ceasefire on 7 Feb 1965, his unit suffered nine killed and approximately 130 wounded out of an authorized unit strength of about 230 persons.

After 11 months at Ft Rucker, he was sent back to Viet Nam. This time with the 1st Marine Air Wing, at Danang. He was there during 1968 Tet Offensive, at which time Walt was the only Army officer in the Wing. He was tasked with assisting in plans for the relief of US Marines in the city of Hue and later, from the combat base in Khe Shan.

Upon his return, he was again assigned to Ft Rucker where he was Chief of the Curriculum Division, which controlled all the aircraft, money, programs of instruction, and program development for the Aviation School. His last tour was at Headquarters TRADOC, where he was Chief of the Training Literature Branch.


For the next 32 years, Walt sold houses in the Greater Dallas Area and immersed himself in every aspect of Dallas Chapter Outreach activities. In 2005-2006, Walt served as the Dallas Chapter Commander, for which he was designated a Chapter Commander *Emeritus*.

Col Richard L. Hamer, USAF, (Ret)

Col Richard (Ric) Hamer is a native Nebraskan and a 1963 graduate of Beatrice High School (In 2014, Ric received the

Beatrice HS Hall of Fame Award).

He graduated from Peru State College with a BS degree in Business Administration. In 1968, he received an MBA degree from the University of Nebraska majoring in business organization and law. He is also a graduate of the Air Command and Staff College and the Air War College.



In 1969, Col. Hamer received his commission from Officer Training School and served in the Air Force for over 30 years. He is a veteran of the Viet Nam War, with over 200 combat missions, flying as a B-52 Radar Navigator. Some of his Air Force assignments include B-52 bombardment squadron operations officer, commander of aircraft avionics maintenance and aircraft organizational maintenance squadrons. In a final assignment he was Director of Combat Plans at Headquarters, Strategic Air Command. Also served as Air War College course director and Base Commander, Maxwell Air Force Base, Montgomery, Alabama.

Col. Hamer retired from active duty in 1999 and has been the Director of Business Development and General Manager for a property management company in the Dallas area ever since. He is currently retired from *paid* employment. He is a past Director of the Greater Dallas Military Foundation and was the Chairman of the Dallas Military Ball, in 2012 and 2016.

He is the former President of the Seidel Chapter of the Air Force Association and past Chairman for the Texas Aerospace Education Foundation. He is also Vice President for Aerospace Education for the Texas-Oklahoma Region of the Air Force Association.

In recognition of his outstanding achievements, he received the Air Force Association's Texas Member of the Year Award in 2012 and the Air Force Association's Chairman Citation, in 2017.

Col. Hamer believes in giving something back to the community by serving with non-profit organizations that make a difference in young peoples' lives, which is what motivated him to become a Companion in the Dallas Chapter of MOWW.
