honor to serve as the Commander for this year. I am humbled by the trust you have placed in me and will, with all my heart, strive to live worthy of that trust.


Departing Commander's Message

Returning to Port

KNOW YOUR CHAPTER'S LEADERS FOR FY 2022

Captain Jeff Butcher, US Army

Captain Jeffery Butcher was born in Tampa, FL and

raised in Massillon, OH. He graduated from the US Military Academy at West Point in 1985, with a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics and was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the Field Artillery. He later earned a Master of Science in Systems Management from the University of Southern California.



His first assignment was to the US Army Jump School, Ft. Benning, GA. He attended *exactly 30 years*, to the month, after his father qualified to be a paratrooper in the famous 101st Airborne Division, during the Korean War.

After the Artillery Officers Basic Course, Jeff was assigned to Augsburg, Germany, in a Corps Artillery 8-inch howitzer battery, as a battery Fire Direction Officer, Platoon Leader, and Battery Executive Officer. His greatest accomplishment in Germany was meeting, and marrying, the beautiful Captain Barbara Carr!

He branch-transferred to Quartermaster Corps and attended the QM Officers Advanced Course at Ft. Lee VA, after which he was assigned to the Eagle Support Brigade at Fort Campbell, KY, in support of the 101st Airborne Division. He was the Commander of the Brigade Headquarters Company during Operation Desert Storm, in 1991.After returning from Desert Storm, he was as an Associate Professor of Military Science at the U. of Arizona.

Jeff resigned his commission in 1992 and took a job as an energy analyst for Fina Oil and Chemical Company of Big Spring, TX. In 1995, an old battery commander of his helped him land a job with Texas Instruments and he worked in various IT roles for the next 22 years.

He also worked for Raytheon, SBC Wireless, Pepsi, and Hewlett-Packard. In 2017 he made another career change and is now a Financial Advisor for Edward Jones.

His hobbies have always revolved around his children...enjoying them, teaching them, being with them. He has been involved with Boy Scouts for nearly 30 years, serving as a Scoutmaster four times along the way.

Jeff and his wife, Barbara, are members of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, in which he has held numerous leadership roles. He is currently serving as the Bishop for the 7th Ward in Plano.

Major Russ Hooper, US Army

Lieutenant Colonel Russell L. Hooper is a native of

TX. He Palestine. graduated from Stephen F. Austin State University as a Distinguished Military Graduate. He was commissioned as an Artillery Officer and completed the Officer Basic Course at Fort Sill, OK. His first assignment was with the Battalion, 79th Field Artillery



(Lance), 42nd Field Artillery Brigade in Germany.

Russ returned to Fort Sill to attend the Officer Advanced Course. Upon completion, he immediately assumed command of Alpha Battery, 1st Battalion,17th Field Artillery Battalion, 75th Field Artillery Brigade. He deployed his unit to Southwest Asia in support of **Operation Desert Storm**. Upon his return, he served as Assistant Plans and Operations Officer for III Corps Artillery at Fort Sill, OK.

LTC Hooper was then assigned as a FORSCOM trainer for the Louisiana National Guard's 256th Mechanized Brigade. He was assigned as the Executive Officer of the 1st Battalion, 141st Field Artillery (self-propelled, 155mm cannon, PALADIN). He served as the Battalion Commander of this unit for four years.

After a brief tour as the Assistant G-3, Operations, he was assigned to the Joint Forces Command Headquarters-Louisiana. His last assignment was the Maintenance and Logistics Officer at Camp Minden, LA. He retired in March 2006 after 20 years of active military service.

LTC Hooper served for two years as the Senior Army Instructor (JROTC) at Emmett J. Conrad High School, Dallas ISD in Dallas, Texas, then, transferred to be the JROTC Coordinator for the DeSoto Independent School District and the Senior Army Instructor at DeSoto High School.

His military awards include the Bronze Star, the Meritorious Service Medal (w/3 OLC), the Army Commendation Medal (w/3 OLC), the National Defense Service Medal and the Liberation of Kuwait Medal.

Russ lives in DeSoto, Texas.

NORTH KOREAN CYBER ATTACKS AGAINST THE UNITED STATES

In February 2018, three Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) computer programmers from the Reconnaissance General Bureau of the North Korean military intelligence agency conducted the first of several cyberattacks.


The first attacks were against Sony Pictures and



included a ransomware called *WannaCry 2.0*. These three North Korean operatives were charged by U.S. Justice Department officials,

on 17 Feb 21, for trying to extort and steal over \$1.3 billion in cryptocurrency and cash from corporations and financial organizations. Their scheme was to use a blockchain platform and install a *phishing* operation targeting defense contractors, DoD, and State department employees, aerospace, technology, and energy companies. The objective of the attacks was to evade US and international sanctions by diverting funds from investors to control marine shipping.

Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA), the FBI, and the Department of Treasury identified malware software designed to cause damage to computer servers, and computer networks. Among the different types of malware



infections are: Trojan horses, viruses, worms, adware, spyware, ransomware, and other lesser-known names. The US government has

labeled the malevolent DPRK state-sponsored cybersecurity threats as "advanced persistent threats," and has named them – *HIDDEN COBRA*.

Cyber terrorist groups have targeted more than 30 countries in the past year. Their primary goals are to circumvent US and international sanctions on North Korea by attacking companies and individuals who use their websites and applications, and then steal cryptocurrency from those organizations and individuals who use it.

Since 2018, the DPRK has used *Hidden Cobra* malware to pose as a cryptocurrency trading platform, enticing victims to download information from a third-party.

The DPRK website and third-party applications appear to



be legitimate, deceiving vendors and individuals who use them. It has appeared on both MS Windows and Apple Mac operating systems. Since the website appears to

be a legitimate cryptocurrency trading website, it has enabled the DPRK to steal hundreds of millions of cryptocurrency dollars, infecting users by phishing and social engineering, then baiting victims to use their malware.


While the technology of blockchain is very innovative, cyber security concerns continue to challenge cryptocurrencies. They have garnered significant

press coverage; however, cryptocurrencies are still considered by many in the financial world to be a speculative high dollar gambling venue.



More tech savvy young people under age 40 use cryptocurrencies. Many of our federal law enforcement agencies have noted block chain currencies are used to launder illicit funds by criminal gangs, cybersecurity criminals, drug lords, high net worth individuals, and state actors, to hide money and evade tax and revenue officials.

As inflation rises, numerous investors use cryptocurrency as a hedge to a declining dollar and inflation. Our national debt is rising to a percentage of Gross



Domestic Product not seen since World War II. Traditional hedges against a declining dollar and inflation - *gold* and *silver* - are not work-

ing. This year, the value of gold has declined, and silver prices have grown less than \$1.00 per ounce.

Cryptocurrencies are not currently regulated. For that reason, citizens should be wary of proposals to move toward digital currencies, as cybersecurity concerns and extreme volatility illustrate ongoing concerns for cryptocurrencies.




Dallas Companion CPT Allen Clark is seen pinning the symbol of a Perpetual member on our newest inductee, Capt David Wallace.

Goals and Objectives

FY 2021 in Review

<u>Veterans</u> – maintained all existing relationships and added VA Advisory Council, the Veteran Center of North Texas, the Collin County Veterans Center and *Joint* Veteran programs with the Association of US Army, Navy League of the US, Air Force Assn., and the Jewish War Veterans Assn.

ROTC – maintained all JROTC and ROTC unit relationships, even though many Dallas ISD schools did not allow direct interface.

National Security – expanded both Homeland and National Security programs through knowledgeable speakers and professional articles in the Chapter Newsletter and the Officer Review magazine.

<u>Scouting</u> – BSA and GSA councils maintained and grew, despite Covid restrictions and unit support organizational limitations.

Patriotic Education – Transitioned Region VIII chapters to a Youth Leadership program, which will be coordinated at Regional level, with nominations and registrations, *online*. School districts are slowly responding as classes begin to return to normal.
