"The Military Order of GA John Pershing"

This year's Installation Banquet will commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the end of The Great War to end all wars.

Germany's all out gamble for victory in 1918, began with the



launch of the Spring offensive on the Western Front, a five-hour, 6,000 gun artillery bombardment, after which 65 German Divisions attacked the British along a 60-mile


front. It is almost unfathomable to imagine such size and scope, considering today's military posture. And then, at last, it was over. On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918, The Great War officially ended.

The total number of military and civilian casualties was more than 41 million. There were over 18 million deaths and 23 million wounded, ranking it among the deadliest conflicts in human history.

In 1919, "5-star" General of the Armies John Pershing created

the Military Order of the Great War as a fraternity for officers who were veterans of the first World War, modeled after the European Military Order of Foreign Wars.

Pershing wore four gold stars - to distinguish himself from 4-star Generals, who wear four *silver* stars.

Youth Leadership Conferences

Under the supervision of the Texas Patriotic Education Foundation, Inc. and the Dallas Chapter, the 14 chapters of MOWW Region 8 have selected over 325 students (from high schools throughout Texas) to attend one of the annual Southwest Youth Leadership Conferences (YLC).

The process begins with on-site interviews to select the best and brightest of more than 500 candidates. The Top Students from 2017 will return in 2018 as Counselors to mentor this year's YLC participants. Six of the students we recognized last September were Valedictorians of their graduating classes, in May. *Our selection process works!*

This year will be the first time that one of the MOWW YLCs will be conducted on the campus of a local university, (the University of Texas, Dallas).

KNOW YOUR COMPANIONS

Gerald Vokolek, Lt. Colonel, US Army

LTC Gerald Vokolek was born on 27 July 1945, in



Queens, NY. He graduated from Hofstra University, Long Island, in June of 1966 and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army Signal Corps.

LT Vokolek was called to active duty in November 1966 and assigned to FT Gordon, GA, and then to FT Monmouth, NJ, for

the Signal Officers Basic Course.

He is also a graduate of the US Army Command and General Staff College, FT Leavenworth, KS.

His first troop assignment was as Commander of the Aviation Electronic Support Company (Prov), in Qui Nhon, Viet Nam, from July 1967 to Aug 1968.

Upon his return from Viet Nam, he served as the Operations Officer (S-3) of the 518th Maintenance Battalion, Jamaica, NY, and then as the S-2, S-3, and S-4 of the 364th General Support Group, FT Totten, NY.

After that, Gerald was transferred to the 63rd US Army Command (ARCOM), Los Angeles, CA. as a Signal Equipment Maintenance Officer. Subsequent assignments included: Assistant Inspector General of the 99th US ARCOM, in Oakdale, PA, and Assistant Chief of Staff, for the 103rd Corps Support Command, Des Moines, IA.

According to his biography, one of his best assignments was with the CAPSTONE program, a 5-week course designed to prepare new flag rank officers to work with foreign armed forces in Joint Commands.

Upon retiring, he pursued a 35-year career in the Retail field, while simultaneously having a 20-year career as a Real Estate broker and office owner.

Gerald currently serves as Chairman of the Texas Association Public Policy Transportation Committee. In addition, he is a Past Chairman and current member of the Collin County Planning Board.

Gerald and his wife, Veronica, will celebrate their 50th anniversary in August of this year. They have 2 daughters and 4 Grandchildren.

Keith Griffitts, 2Lt, US Army Reserves

Keith Griffitts, born on 10 July 1942. He is a native of



Wichita Falls, Texas, and has lived in Richardson and Plano, TX, since 1974. He graduated from Hardin-Simmons University in 1964 with a B.S. degree in history and from the University of North Texas. Denton, TX, in 1965 with a Master of Education degree in counseling & psy-

chology.

Keith enlisted in the U. S. Army Reserve and was assigned to HHD 2d Brigade, 89th Division, in Denver CO in November 1965. After basic training at Fort Bliss, TX, and AIT at Fort Huachuca, AZ, he graduated from the Colorado National Guard Officer Candidate School in Denver, CO, and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant of Infantry.

His initial assignment was to the 490th Civil Affairs Company in Abilene, TX. He confessed that the unit was over strength on officers, so he and the chaplain and two field grade officers occupied a room, with the door shut, so no one would know that they had nothing to do!

Keith spent 33 years in the oil and gas business, where he founded and operated an exploration and production company that drilled and developed oil and gas properties in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Louisiana. During his time in the oil and gas business he was involved in such new innovations as horizontal drilling, 3-D seismic, and advanced fracturing techniques.

He was a Trustee and member of the Board of Development of Hardin-Simmons University for 15 years. He is listed in *Who's Who in Finance and Industry*, 1989-2002, and *Who' Who in Exploration and Production*, 2005-2013. He was a member of the Midland Oil Industry Finance Committee, the Dallas Wildcatters Group, and the Dallas Petroleum Club.

Keith and his wife, Cherry, have five children and six grandchildren. He and Cherry love traveling and spending quality time with their children.



In this year alone, we have heard from two Chapter Companions who are "published authors".




Since then, two more Companions have been successful in seeing their literary efforts go to press.

The Chaplain's Message



Memorial Day evokes especially powerful emotions in veterans. Why, we may ask, would God allow my brother or daughter, father, or friend, to be taken from me in defense of our country? More pointedly, we may ask God, "Where were You?"

In such times, it helps to remember that we are not alone in asking. In Psalm 13, King David, asks "How long, O Lord? Will you forget me? How long will you hide your face from me? How long will I have sorrow in my heart?"

It is no accident that these words are enshrined in Holy Scripture. God desires our honesty, *especially* when - we are angry, sorrowful, or in despair. In truth, God never leaves our side. He says, "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways." (Is. 55:9, NIV)

As humans, we do not see the whole picture as God does. We can only put our trust in Him, knowing that He loves us more deeply and completely than we can imagine. David himself comes around to this acknowledgement, writing "But I trust in your unfailing love, and my heart rejoices in your salvation." If Memorial Day has resurrected in you sorrow for a lost veteran, I pray that you will bind this eternal truth on your heart.

"Defending the Force"

Craig Vanbeeber oversees the largest of the four weapons systems divisions of Lockheed Martin.
