The Silent Service, the US Nuclear Submarine Fleet

Former LT (US Navy) Tom Meyer prefaced his presentation

by sharing a brief video with us (click HERE if you missed it). It was the first time in over twenty years in which a civilian film crew was authorized to embark aboard a US Nuclear Submarine and record daily life aboard the boat. The video provides a fascinating insight into the world of the "iron men" who spend six months at a time in the pitch black of the ocean's deepest trenches in a 500-foot long, steel

windowless tube, sleeping next to a nuclear reactor.

Tom served under the leadership of Admiral Hyman G. Rickover, the man credited with creating and controlling naval nuclear propulsion operations for three decades, as the Director of the Office of US Naval Reactors.


Where were You in 1968?

Max: The four-legged lifesaver

For most, a dog's life is pretty easy; fetching balls, chasing squirrels, dreaming of that giant bone in the sky.

But for Max, life was a deadly challenge, living on the edge of disaster every day, for Max was an IED Detector Dog, serving in Iraq and Afghanistan. He is credited with preventing the death of countless US Marines in combat.

Max was taught to stay, unleashed, 10 - 15 feet in front of the Marines in their

mine-resistant armored vehicle, while searching for IED's and clearing the route of explosives.

Max could detect nine distinct different chemical odors that are most commonly used in Improvised Demolition

devices. In 2018, Max received an Honorable Discharge and is now living a life of luxury in Weatherford, TX, fetching balls, chasing squirrels and reaping the rewards of a life well-lived.
