

"The Flying Grunt"

Lieutenant General Richard Carey (USMC, Ret)



enlisted in the United States Navy's aviation cadet program in 1945. As WWII ended, he was discharged and so he enlisted in the Marine Corps where he advanced to the rank of Sergeant prior to his commissioning as a Second Lieutenant in 1948. As a rifle platoon commander, he participated in the Korean War in the 1st Marine

Division, including the landings at Inchon and the Battle of Chosin Reservoir. He earned the Silver Star for heroism while serving as commander of Weapons Company, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines in 1951, prior to his medical evacuation to the States after being wounded in action.

During the Vietnam war, he commanded Marine Squadron 13 and later Fighter Attack Squadron 115 (VMA-115) flying the F-4 (Phantom) in combat operations, operating from Chu Lai Air Base in 1967-68.

His awards and decorations include: the Silver Star; two Legion of Merit awards; the Distinguished Flying Cross; two Bronze Stars for Valor, 15 Air Medals; a Purple Heart; the Joint Service Commendation Medal; two Presidential Unit Citations; two Navy Unit Commendations; and a Meritorious Unit Commendation.

His story is told in the book: The Flying Grunt, by Alan E. Mesches. Alan will join us to hear LtGen Carey's talk.

Concerns about the US Dollar remaining the World's Reserve Currency

Since 1945, the US dollar has been the primary reserve currency of the world economy. Historically, reserve currencies of the world endure for about 100 years. Unless more attention is paid to maintaining the US dollar as the world's reserve currency, it is unlikely to escape the fate of its predecessors.

The dollar is not only the most widely held reserve currency, but it is a fiat currency, not backed by a commodity, but backed by the "full faith and credit" of the US government. Every previous fiat currency has ended in devaluation or hyperinflation. Most hyper-inflation is caused by government overspending, where budget shortfalls are financed by printing more currency.

The International Monetary Fund recently stated they will



not use the US dollar to benchmark other countries' economies. The US dollar is losing its status as the primary reserve currency because other countries (Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia, Brazil, India) are replacing it and using their own currencies, or China's yuan.

If other nation's respect and have confidence in the US government because of its rule of law, justice system, military preparedness, and economic system, it could remain the primary reserve currency. However, faith in the US government and its systems are diminishing both at home and abroad.

Many American citizens believe America has a multi-tiered justice system. Numerous former military officers believe our military is less prepared and equipped to fight a war now than in the past. Lastly, many allies and other countries are beginning to doubt the credibility and sincerity of our diplomats and the leadership of the US government.

There is less confidence in our economic and banking system, because of poor policies by our government leaders. Allies and adversaries are questioning US economic decision-making concerning US debt, inflation, banking crises, and planned energy spending.

American leadership is not inspiring many in the world, and some allies and enemies are looking for another reserve currency. Adversaries and enemies are always plotting to unseat American military and economic leadership, and lately, they seem to be succeeding.

China has agreed to a military cooperation treaty with Russia where they will provide arms to the Russians in return for buying Russian oil. China also penned an agreement with Saudi Arabia to buy their oil using the yuan, rather than the dollar for currency. Additionally, China made agreements with Turkey, India, and Brazil which agreed to use their currencies instead of the dollar.

Afghanistan was not the finest moment for the world to observe US military and diplomatic success. The resulting chaos has created doubt with allies and opportunities for enemies. France just penned an agreement with China for liquified natural gas to be purchased in yuan, not dollars.

The US is rapidly moving away from its once preeminent superpower status, while China is maneuvering to replace it. Fortunately, China does not follow the rule of law, or observe international accounting standards, but does have the second largest bond market in the world. It is a one-party authoritarian communist government, and concerns remain over China's political stability and the fact the yuan is not fully convertible. China does have a strong and growing military. This is concerning at a time when US military power is waning.

Having the world's reserve currency and a strong US dollar has been good for both the world and America. Unfortunately, the US is once again dependent on others to provide the fossil fuels necessary to run its economy. The current administration released 180 million barrels of oil from the

Strategic Petroleum Reserve, and even sent a million barrels to help China. Inflation is likely to remain high in the US, as petroleum prices increase, and the Federal Reserve keeps interest rates high.



If the US dollar were not the reserve currency of the world, American citizens would suffer a lower standard of living. Unless the US maintains a strong military, and improves its policy decision-making, our time having the reserve currency of the world may come to an end. If the US desires to keep the dollar as the world's reserve currency, it should consider the negative effects of poor policy decisions, which have led to debt, inflation, printing money, an undermanned military, and jeopardizes the strength of the US dollar.


