National Defense Seminars, Season Two

At 4:00 p.m. on <u>9 October 2022</u>, in the Heritage Ranch Country Club (465 Scenic Ranch Circle, McKinney, TX), **Season Two** of the National Defense Briefing Series will focus on "Future Warfighting Concepts".

The U.S. record for predicting the future of warfare is notoriously poor. Former U.S. Secretary of Defense, Rob-

ert Gates, famously quipped, "When it comes to predicting the nature and location of our next military engagements, our record has been *perfect*. We have <u>never once</u> gotten it right, from the Mayaguez to Grenada, Panama,

Somalia, the Balkans, Haiti, Kuwait, Iraq, and more—we had no idea a year before any of these missions that we would be so engaged." And yet, for better or worse, the U.S. military is deeply invested in the forecasting business because the services need to start building today what will be needed one or even two decades from now.

The future of warfare will require additional investments

in precision, information, and automation; more capacity to tackle the challenges posed by each of our five potential adversaries; enhanced forward posture in all three theaters of concern; and a renewed emphasis

on agility at every echelon.

The NDSB Keynote Speaker on 09 Oct 22, will be Dallas Chapter Companion, John Antal:

Colonel John Antal (USA, Ret) served 30 years in the US

Army as a combat arms (Armor) officer. He commanded units from platoon through regiment and served on Corps and *multinational* staffs.

At the Pentagon, he served as Special Assistant to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and later retired after serving at Fort Hood, Texas, where he was the Operations Officer (G-3) of the 165,000 personnel of III Armored Corps.

In his post-Army career, he has been a military consultant, a video game producer, a magazine editor, a talk show host, and the author of sixteen books and hundreds of articles on military and leadership subjects, including: 7 Leadership Lessons of D-Day and 7 Leadership Lessons of the American Revolution.

John's latest book, 7 Seconds to Die, is an excellent text-

book for today's military strategists and should be required reading for anyone interested in understanding the changing methods of war.

His book was the basis for his presentation to the chapter during our July Luncheon. In it, he documents the Second Nagorno-Karabakh War -- the first war in history won primarily by unmanned drones and combat systems.



John served on the US Army Science Board educating active-duty military leaders on the lessons of recent military conflicts highlighting the changing methods of warfare.

THE AMERICAN STRATEGIC PETROLEUM RESERVE

The American Strategic Petroleum Reserve (SPR) is administered by the Department of Energy (DOE) and has historically been the world's largest supply of crude oil to be used in an emergency.

This supply is a federally owned emergency stockpile which is stored in four underground salt caverns near the Louisiana and Texas Gulf coast. The purpose of the American SPR is to prevent economic and political disruption to the US if its oil supply is restricted or cutoff. This makes the SPR a valuable political and economic tool for the US to prevent oil import cutoffs from any source.

The amount of oil typically stored in the SPR is a deterrent to those seeking to disrupt the US economy, because it provides physical and economic insurance against oil interruption. The President has the authority to release supplies of the SPR, as authorized by the **Energy Policy and Conservation Act**, if there is a significant supply disruption.

The American SPR came into existence because of the 1973 Arab embargo to the US from the *Organization of*



Arab and Petroleum Exporting Countries (OAPEC) when they executed an oil embargo against the US. This OAPEC action created historic oil supply disruptions within the US and

Western Allies and led to a severe US recession.

Historically, the SPR has been used only in emergencies when the US is faced with critical, economically damaging conditions which would disrupt oil supplies. *Desert Storm, Hurricane Katrina, and the IEA Coordinated release* were times the SPR was tapped into.

Most other countries now have SPRs. Australia, Germany,

Japan, UK, Chile, Columbia, Israel, all EU countries, and many Asian countries have SPRs.

China, India, and Russia are building their SPRs.

China is the largest energy importer in the world and has contracted with Russia for even larger amounts of petroleum. China's SPR plans to provide it with a 90-day oil supply, whereas the US SPR is a 60-day supply when filled to capacity. Using the SPR for political purposes to lower gasoline prices is not in the strategic interests of the US. Some politicians seem to not understand that the price of oil is determined by supply and demand.

Communist China has the second largest SPR. Selling millions of barrels of oil from the American SPR to the Communist Chinese government is also not in the strategic interests of the US. *In 2019, DOE reported the SPR was 727 million barrels, now, it is at a 38-year low (1984).*

The drawbacks of not having an adequate SPR for emergencies such as war, natural disasters, and other national defense contingencies are irresponsible. According to the American Petroleum Institute CEO, Mike Sommers, today's American SPR is at its lowest level since 1984.

In the same interview, he stated that policy makers should be concerned about these depleted levels of petroleum which are now at historically low levels. The DOE also stated last month that the SPR should be replenished for national security reasons.

Until an alternate energy source is developed, petroleum

supply disruptions severely curtail the US economy. If supplies of oil are reduced by government policy, and demand increases, prices rise. Since US energy policy is petroleum




based, restricting petroleum supplies is a formula for increased prices.

As most goods in the US and world are transported by ships, airplanes, trains, and trucks, which all use petroleum products, prices will rise on those goods shipped, causing inflation. A more thoughtful energy policy is needed by the US.

America and the rest of the world are decades from a

petroleum-free world.
Destroying the American economy and energy industry is a recipe for the US to become dependent on dictators, oligarchs, corporate



socialists, and tyrants who are motivated to eliminate American freedoms, sovereignty, and power if they are allowed to dominate or dictate US energy policy.
