of Rockwall. After graduating from Texas A&M University in 1989, she received her Law degree from Southern Methodist University. Following graduation, she joined the Dallas County District Attorney's Office, where she was a prosecutor from 1992 to 1995. She received extensive trial experience in those years as she was in the courtroom almost every day throughout that tenure.

In 1995, she went into private practice and became Board Certified in Criminal Law. She became a partner at the Dallas firm of Milner and Finn, and, in 2004, she and former Judge Jim Pruitt created the law firm of Culpepper & Pruitt with offices in both Dallas and Rockwall Counties.

In November of 2008, Kenda was elected as the Rockwall County Criminal District Attorney, the first woman in that office in the history of North Texas. She handles almost all the criminal prosecutions in Rockwall County. She has been reelected, five times, to subsequent four-year terms.

Ms. Culpepper has been named by Texas Monthly as a *Texas* Super Lawyer; by D Magazine as one of the Best Lawyers in Dallas; and by Forbes as one of America's Most Influential Women.

Theodore Roosevelt said: "The lives of true heroism are those in which there are no great deeds to look back on, the little things well done go to make up a successful and truly good life." These quotes tell us that it is not just the highest proclaimed military leaders that inspire our youth, it is actually each and every



one of us who actually build the patriotism, and hence the Independence of our great nation.

Our youth's patriotism will be the foundation upon which lasting independence will be built. We MUST do everything, as veterans, that we can to grow that Patriotism. Please join me in the coming year, as we endeavor to build long term relationships with our local Veteran and Museum resources, for the sake of our youth and country.

# LTC Russ Hooper, US Army (Jr Vice CDR)

Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) Russell L. Hooper is a



native of Palestine, TX. He graduated Stephen Austin State University as a Distinguished Military Graduate. He was commissioned as an Artillery Officer and completed the Officer Basic Course at Fort Sill, OK. His first assignment was with the Battalion, 79<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery (Lance), 42<sup>nd</sup> Field

Artillery Brigade in Germany.

Russ returned to Fort Sill to attend the Officer Advanced Course. Upon completion, he immediately assumed command of Alpha Battery, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion,17th Field Artillery Battalion, 75<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Brigade. He deployed his unit to Southwest Asia in support of **Operation Desert Storm**. Upon his return, he served as Assistant Plans and Operations Officer, III Corps Artillery at Fort Sill, OK.

LTC Hooper was then assigned as a FORSCOM trainer for the Louisiana National Guard's 256<sup>th</sup> Mechanized Brigade. He was assigned as the Executive Officer of the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, 141st Field Artillery (self-propelled 155mm cannon, PALADIN). He served as the Battalion Commander of this unit for four years.

After a brief tour as the Assistant G-3, Operations, he was assigned to the Joint Forces Command Headquarters-Louisiana. His last assignment was the Maintenance and Logistics Officer at Camp Minden, LA. He retired in March 2006 after 20 years of active military service.

LTC Hooper served for two years as the Senior Army Instructor (JROTC) at Emmett J. Conrad High School, Dallas ISD in Dallas, Texas, then, transferred to be the JROTC Coordinator for the DeSoto Independent School District and the Senior Army Instructor at DeSoto High School.

His military awards include the Bronze Star, the Meritorious Service Medal (w/3 OLC), the Army Commendation Medal (w/3 OLC), the National Defense Service Medal and the Liberation of Kuwait Medal.

He enlisted as an Infantryman in the Oregon National Guard in 2002. He received a commission

LT Brandon Hern, US Army (Adjutant)

Brandon Hern was born in Burlingame, CA and was

Brandon's first active duty assignment was as an enlisted soldier. He deployed with the 1<sup>st</sup> Cavalry Division out of Foot Hood, TX in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom II from 2003-2005. He was a 240B Gunner for the 1<sup>st</sup> Cav Div Rapid Reaction Force (RRF). Brandon received the Bronze Star with Valor for his actions during the Battle of Najaf in late 2004.

His next deployments were as an NCO in a reconnaissance unit in the Oregon National Guard. He did two separate month-long deployments in Mongolia and Japan. After receiving his commission as an Infantry Officer, Brandon was given an infantry platoon out of Charlie Company, 2/162. After graduating as the Honor Graduate at Infantry Officer Basic Course in Fort Benning, GA, Brandon was released from duty having suffered multiple injuries.

Brandon separated from Active Duty at the rank of 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant, and returned to Dallas, TX, where he began working as an Assistant Vice President at Capital One Bank.

Brandon now runs a Private Equity group that specializes in the syndication and acquisition of multi-family real estate. Additionally, he works for Integrity Mortgage, owns a property management company – Bronze Star Properties – and coaches select baseball.

Brandon and his wife, Andrea, have been married for 7 years and currently live in Dallas. They have two sons: Ethan (13) and Alex (7).

# **The National Intelligence Community**

The US Intelligence Community (IC), consists of 17 different organizations. Nine of them are <u>not</u> part of the Department of Defense.

The Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI) are independent of DoD or any other federal department.



The CIA, the most well-known US intelligence agency, primarily collects *overseas* intelligence, using human assets and foreign agents. The CIA is also involved in paramilitary operations and offensive cyber intelligence operations. The CIA collects intelligence on counterterrorism, nuclear proliferation (as well as other weapons of mass destruction).



ODNI manages and disseminates intelligence products to policymakers, collected from all 17 US intelligence agencies in the Intelligence Community. The other seven intelligence agencies are

within federal departments.


The Department of Energy specializes in energy related intelligence ranging from nuclear energy to collecting information on oil drilling and refining. They protect vital national security information and intellectual property against cyber, foreign intelligence threats, and terrorists.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has two



intelligence agencies. The DHS Office of Intelligence and Analysis, is responsible for assessing, identifying, current and future threats to the US using intelligence from multiple sources to protect the

homeland.







The Department of Justice also has two intelligence agencies. First, the FBI, which is involved in *domestic* intelligence, counterespionage, and terrorism.



The Department of Justice also heads the Drug Enforcement Agency's Office of National Security Intelligence, which is focused on drug interdiction.

The Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research focuses on analytical intelligence to inform diplomats and foreign affairs officials on potentially hostile individuals and locations.





The Department of Treasury's Office of Intelligence and Analysis specializes in countering money laundering, counterfeiting, and illegal activities involving money or economic markets.

The Executive Branch of the government, and others,

direct strategic questions to the ODNI. These questions could ask the size of an adversarial force, threats and potential threats from an adver-




sary, capabilities of an adversary (weapons, payloads, army, navy, or air force), or probable course of action.

ODNI then determines which intelligence disciplines are needed to answer the questions. These intelligence disciplines are: Counterintelligence, Human Intelligence, Imagery Intelligence, Measurement and Signature Intelligence, and Signals Intelligence. The ODNI then selects the best agency or agencies to gather the information.

The intelligence process begins a cycle of several steps to convert information into confirmed intelligence for decisionmakers. These steps include: **Planning** to

determine what information needs to be collected; **Collection** the gathering of information from multiple sources; **Analysis** - evaluating the information collected and determining what intelligence is to be dissem-



inated; and **Dissemination**- distributing the completed intelligence products to policymakers. All 17 agencies provide their intelligence to national command authorities and policymakers who act on it to counter the constant threats our country faces.
